

# Hood Travel forfeits two in a row to drop from first

## Bantam softball girls advance to provincial championship

The Milton Royal Canadian Legion bantam girls softball team has advanced to the provincial grand championship with a convincing tournament victory in Kingston on the weekend.

The Milton squad recorded victories in six of their seven games to walk away with the gold medal and the right to represent the town of Milton at the tournament to be played in Niagara Falls on August 14-16.

The victory was a costly one for the local squad as Janis Naylor was injured in the first inning of the first game and will be lost to the team for the remainder of the regular season. She is expected to return for the provincial tournament.

In the opening game of the tourney, Milton faced a tough Burlington team and recorded a 10-4 win. Jayne Currie took the win as the pitcher. Charity Crombie (homer), Krista Todd (triple, single), Karen Smith (double, single) and Corinn Jeffrey (double, single) led the offensive charge.

Milton lost their second contest 9-8 to Lindsay the

eventual bronze medal winners. Milton's bats were silent until the final inning when they staged a dramatic come back only to fall one run short.

Leading hitters were Todd with a homer, and Wendy Nielson and Currie both of whom had a double and a single. Cathy Raynor doubled.

Milton bounced back with a 9-0 drubbing of Barrie. They were led by flawless defence and the pitching of Raynor. Leading the hit parade were Crombie with a triple and double, and Lisa Donegan and Jeffrey who both tripled and singled.

In their fourth game Milton crushed Kars/Manitok 14-1 behind timely hitting and a stingy defence, a combination that is unbeatable. Currie claimed the win as the pitcher.

Shailene Jeffrey had three hits including a double and triple, Darcy McTrach had three hits, one of which was a triple, both Corinn Jeffrey and Todd had a double and a single, and Currie had three singles.

## Ryan Leworthy wheels to gold

Ryan Leworthy's racing season is over. And a successful season it's been.

Leworthy, 16, one of the premier wheelchair racers in Ontario, proved that statement is true for the whole of Canada as he recently claimed gold in the 400 metre and the 1,500 metre races at the Canadian Junior National Track and Field Championships held at the University of Manitoba in Winnipeg.

Leworthy finished the 400 metres unofficially in 1:05.92 which was a few seconds slower than his personal best time. He lagged more than half a minute behind his personal best in the 1,500 which he finished in 4:33.

According to Ryan's father Mike the track conditions were difficult with a headwind and a soft track, both of which made it difficult to post top times. In the 1,500 metre race Leworthy finished so far in front that he was unable to use anybody else's position to draft on in the wind.

Two weeks prior to the Winnipeg meet, Leworthy competed in the Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled in Sudbury. He racked up four golds and a silver. He managed golds in the 100 metres, the 200 metres where he posted a personal best, the 400 metres and the 800 metres, another personal best. In the 1,500 he finished second despite not feeling well.

His time in the 200 metre race qualified him for the Canadian Olympic Trials in Sherbrooke, Quebec. Leworthy decided to by-pass the trials primarily because he is still a junior and would be unlikely to qualify for Barcelona. His real goal is the 1996 Olympics in Atlanta where he will be competing as a 20 year old.

"We were really gratified to know that he had met the qualifying standard," said Mike Leworthy. "Our real goal is Atlanta 1996. That's what he's been working toward."

and goaltender Willie Noon.

In their final game Milton lost 6-3 to the hometown Orangeville side. Despite tying the score at 3-3 late in the second period the lack of depth on the bench hurt Milton as they tired in the third.

The championships continue with games in Burlington in two weeks.
