

This player cheats at video game rental store

An unknown man cheated a Bronte Street video store July 27 when he gave a fake name while renting video equipment.

The man failed to return five video games and a console worth \$700, which he rented last week.

Police said the man used a name and identification number that matched, but didn't belong to him.

The suspect is described as 6 feet tall, tanned, with brown shoulder-length hair, and a moustache.

The incident occurred at about 5:45 p.m. near a wooded area at the back of the Ontario Street school.

The man is described as 5'10" with a slim build, and short, light brown hair. He is in his early 40s, balding, was wearing a black t-shirt, loose-fitting grey shorts with stripes on the

side, and gold-rimmed eye glasses.

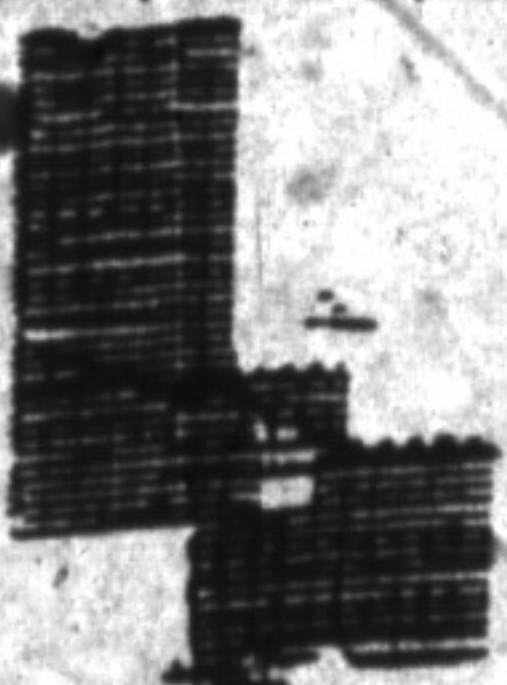

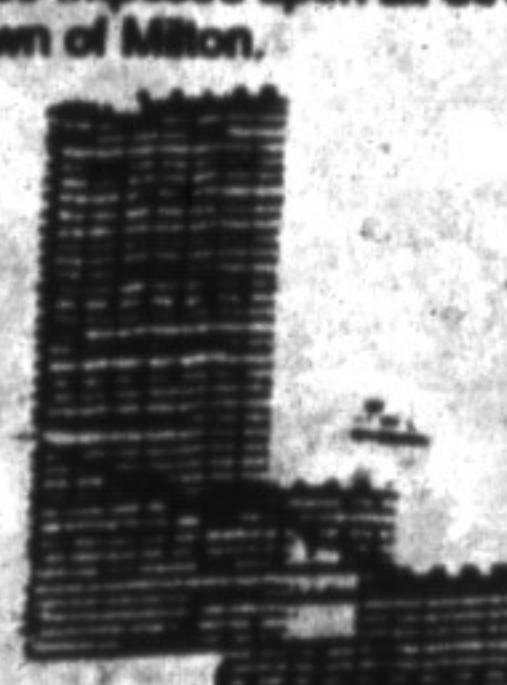

CRIME STOPPERS OF HALTON

Thieves score football equipment

Halton Regional Police in Georgetown and Crime Stoppers are seeking information from the public that leads to the arrest of those responsible for a break-in at a storage unit which netted thieves \$11,305 worth of property.

On July 26, culprits broke into a storage unit at the U-Store U-Move storage facility at 7732 Winston Churchill Blvd., south of Steeles Avenue in Georgetown.

The culprits are believed to have cut the "Curtis" padlock off the storage unit and using a vehicle removed a large quantity of football equipment belonging to the Mississauga Wolverines Football Club.

The property stolen included 39 pairs of "Bike" brand shoulder pads, sizes ranging from 36 to 58, valued at \$4,775.

Also stolen were:
• 25 "Air pact 2" navy blue football helmets valued at \$4,125;

• 25 chin straps and masks valued at \$450;
• 20 blue canvas football bags valued at \$400;
• 60 blue nylon belts valued at \$60;

• 15 "Bike" brand thigh pads valued at \$120;
• 15 pair of Max Pro MLHC girdles valued at \$435;
• 4 top flite Spalding footballs valued at \$540;
• End zone markers valued at \$400.

Crime Stoppers is operated by a board of directors made up of 18 civilians from all areas of Halton Region.

The Board of Directors raises the money, decides on the amount of the rewards and actually pays the rewards. Crime Stoppers is incorporated as a charitable organization, therefore all donations to the reward fund are tax deductible.
