Squirt girls go undefeated to move to provincial championships

The Milton Lions squirt girls softball team has advanced to the provincial grand championship (Tier II) with a convincing tournament victory in Markham last weekend.

The Milton 11-12 year olds made it through their nine-team double elimination regional qualifying tournament undefeated. Their four victories earned them the gold medal and the right to represent Milton at the tournament, to be played in Streetsville on August 14-16.

In the opening game Saturday morning, Milton faced a talented team from Cobourg and pounded out an 18-5 win. Michelle Gregory pitched a strong seven innings, giving up two hits and getting 10 strikeouts for the victory.

Virginia Young had two triples, a double and five RBI. Tanya Fiorita had a triple and three RBI, Kristen Haringa had a two run single, Christina Best a double and two RBI and Lindsay Grisold batted out a triple and double to pace the offence. The result was still in doubt until the top of the seventh when Milton batted around for seven runs.

Milton struggled for two innings against their next opponents from Belleville, who converted two errors and five walks into a tie score. That

was as close to the win as Belleville would get as 19 Milton batters came to the plate in the third and scored 15 runs.

Michelle Gregory struck out the side in the bottom of the third and the umpires invoked the mercy rule to end the contest in Milton's favour.

Grisold led the way with a home run, two singles and five RBI. Laura Spagnuolo homered and singled twice which Candace Wrigglesworth doubled and singled, Haringa batted out four singles and Virginia Young tripled and doubled.

The Sunday 9 early game pitted Milton against the only other undefeated team in the tournament. Streetsville played with great spirit and a tight defence. However, the girls from Milton were just as determined.

With the score tied 1-1 in the top of the third, the versatile Milton offence rose to the occasion. Julie Leal and Grisold laid down back-to-back

bunt singles and Haringa brought them home.

Streetsville wouldn't give up and at the end of five frames Milton held only a 7-5 lead. Homers by Young and Grisold in the sixth put the game out of reach. Michelle Gregory pitched six strong innings and Leal set the side down in order in the seventh to seal the 12-6 victory.

In the Sunday afternoon championship final Streetsville again proved themselves worthy opponents. Milton's victory was in doubt right to the last out. Trailing 8-6 in their last at-bat, the Milton batters held their ground until Haringa cracked a three run double and Milton took the lead.

A fine defensive play by Spagnuolo robbed a Streetsville batter of what looked like a sure double with the bases loaded and one out to save the victory. Grisold homered and doubled, Haringa singled, Best singled and Janin Hanif doubled and singled for the Milton offence.

Leal and Gregory came through again with strong pitching performances.

Lacrosse peewees win silver

Milton's Realty World peewee lacrosse selects claimed silver in the Mississauga Tournament with an 8-1 win over Markham recently.

In their first game Milton crushed Clarkson 11-0. Jamie Sweetland scored three times, Cory Leigh and Derek Birnie had two each while Adam McIssac, Paul Boaden, Joseph Lake and Jason Enair each had one.

Assists went to Leigh with four, Blair Beaulieu with three and Enair, Jeff Mitchell, Jonathan Glover, Jason Ford, Andrew Peers and Sweetland with one each.

In their second contest Milton played Owen Sound to a 5-5 tie. Milton's goals came from Leigh with three, while Beaulieu and

Sweetland had one each. Sweetland had two assists while Birnie and Peers had one apiece.

In their third contest Milton lost to Nepean 3-2. Milton was all over Nepean from the start of the game but wore the paint off the goal posts, unable to hit the mesh. Leigh scored both Milton markers with Enair gaining two assists.

Milton's loss put them in the silver medal game, which they won 8-1 over Markham. Leigh, Sweetland, Boaden and McIssac, each scored twice. Assists were by Enair with two, Birnie with two, Glover, Beaulieu, Lake and McIssac with one each. The MVP in the medal game for Milton was Adam McIssac.

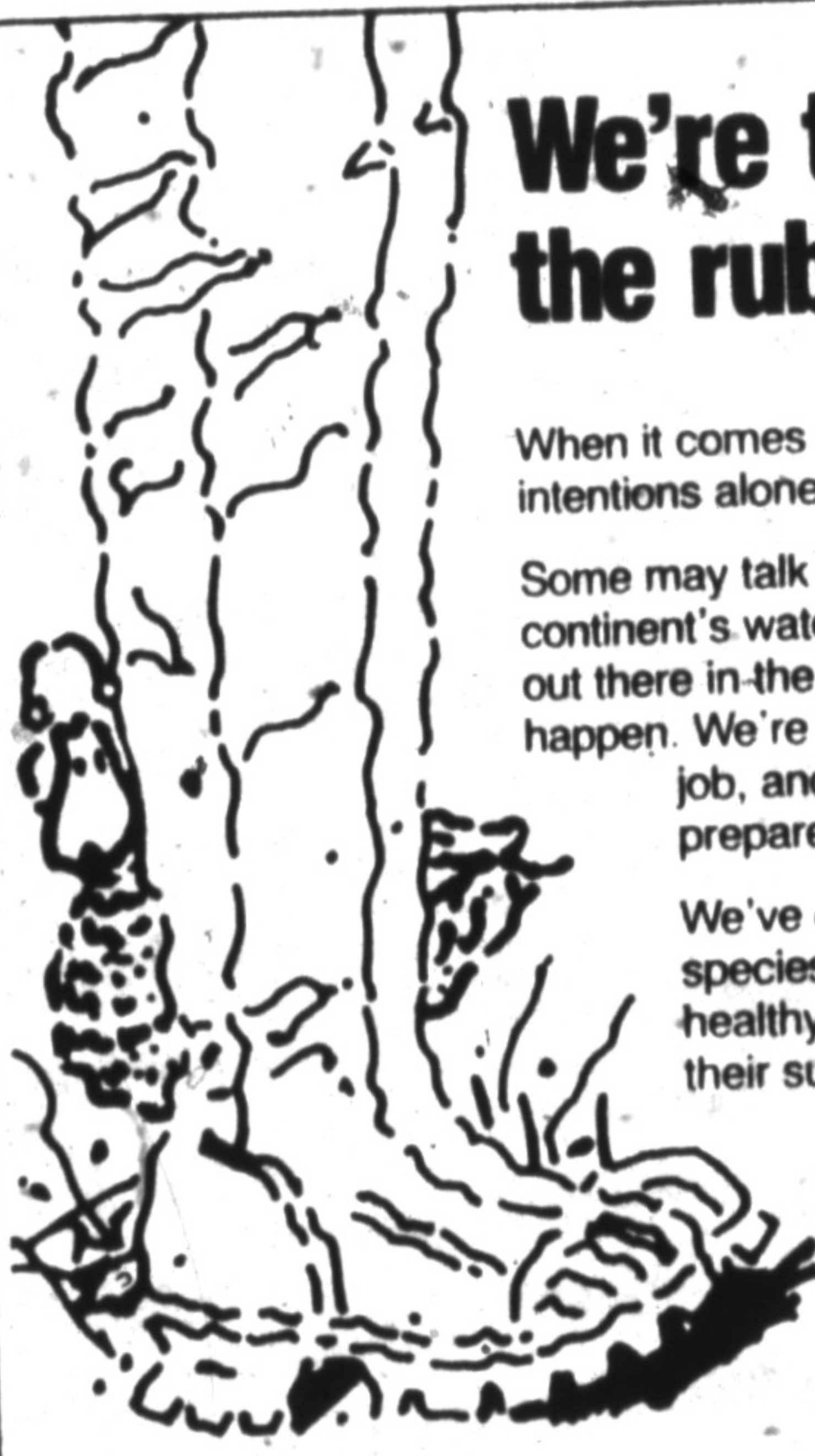
