This year's number of hours is much less than was requested by the triple A organization and according to vice-chairman Terry Brandt, is not sufficient for the teams' needs.

"We have tried talking to the GMHA and with the Town of Halton Hills but have had no success," said

"Why should we be giving away our prime ice time if it's not going to be used? This doesn't make sense," aid Pells, who has been GMHA esident for three years. "We will have more players on both our rep and house league teams this season and we need to take back some ice time for our own players."

Brandt said that the majority of the lurricanes are from Milton but only ecause many of the best players nd coaches are from Milson. He aid that the GMHA's estimate of sed ice time is "not true."

"If we pay our ice fee each month, hey (the GMHA) shouldn't be concerned if the ice is used or not."

Brandt also said that the entire five and a quarter hours of granted ice time in Georgetown this season is at the Georgetown Memorial Arena and not at Gordon Alcott Arena. He

Brandt said that the ice time situa tion is an on-going problem and the GMHA should be working with the Hurricanes and not against them. Speaking on behalf of the GMHA. Polts feels the ice time awarded to the Halton Hurricanes is fair, and he says he doesn't see any real problems with the situation as it stands.

Brandt said that if these problems with ice time continue, the organization may be forced to curb registration in the near future.

On September 20 the aged distaffers will move into the limelight for the \$100,000 (est) Milton Pacing Stakes for three year olds and up, fillies and mares.

The highlight of the fall meet is The Breeders Crown,
