Protest fails to tax plan

The first round of the final battle over implementing market value assessment (MVA) at Halton Region went to the pro-MVA side Wednesday, despite the best efforts of 70 vocal protesters.

Even though Halton's administration and finance committee supported the MVA property taxation plan by no means makes it a sure thing at regional council.

The same angry property owners, largely from Oakville, are almost certain to vent their emotions. And the rift that MVA created at the committee level will probably be played out at full council this Wednesday (Sept. 23) too.

While Halton politicians supporting MVA, and regional treasurer Joe Rinaldo, depicted it as a fairer tax system because it's linked to the true current value of properties, opponents said it was the wrong tax at the wrong time and will likely lead an expensive bureaucratic nightmare.

Market value assessment will shift more of the residential property tax burden to Oakville and away from Burlington because home market values are seen to be higher in Oakville. The study uses 1988 for a base - see NEW PROPERTY on page 7

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Terry Fox Run has special meaning for McFadzean family

Karen and Rick McFadzean will pedal their bicycle built for two Sunday for a cause they say has saved their son's sight.

Coming along for the ride will be the Lauren, 4, and 22-month-old Stephen who was born with retinoblastoma.

Research on cancer of the retina has meant Stephen will retain his sight - unlike his mother who, at the age of six months, lost her eyes to the disease before doctors knew how to treat it.

That's why the Wakefield Drive family won't miss Sunday's Terry Fox Run recalls. which raises money exclusively for cancer research.

"It's amazing what's happened in the last 10 years," says Mrs. McFadzean, 34. "The survival rate for children with cancer is something like 80 per cent now. It used to be 20 per cent."

Because retinoblastoma is hereditary, the couple's children have a 50 per cent Milton couple's three children - Leah, 7, chance of developing cancerous tumours in their eyes. So far, Leah and Lauren are free of the disease, and will likely never be affected.
