"The community has done a lot for us and we want to give it back," said Mr. Andrews.

The farm's family theme is recognized through the Pumpkin Challenge, a fun event for children. In the pumpkin growing contest, the Andrews donate money to charities the winners choose.

School tours are another common sight at the farm, said Mrs. Andrews who handles the business's behind the scenes work such as bookkeeping.

A determination to supply his customers with "high-quality products" is Mr. Andrews' secret to success, he said.

The Andrews also give credit to their 30 staff members who they said are always "friendly and warm" with customers.

"We've got the greatest staff and students we could have," commented Mr. Andrews.

"The staff have stuck with us," added his wife. "They tend to work for us year after year."

Andrews Scenic Acres appears to have continued success guaranteed. Despite the summer's poor weather, business is up about 25 per cent this

Garth Turner to host constitutional meetings

Halton Peel MP Garth Turner will host a number of information forums and appear on cable tv to discuss the proposed constitutional amendments Canadians will vote on in the October 26 referendum.

Mr. Turner favours the deal, but indicated in a recent press release that he will be taking a hands off position as the local discussions unfold.

"I believe it's my responsibility to do all I can to stimulate that debate, while making sure every effort is put into providing people with the information they need to arrive at their own decision."

Mr. Turner is hosting a constitutional meeting on Wednesday, Oct. 14 at the Campbellville Lion's Hall. The meeting gets underway at 7:30 pm. He's holding a similar event on Tuesday, Oct. 20 at the Nassagaweya Centre in Brookville. In all, he

has scheduled nine such gatherings across the Halton-Peel riding.

In addition, Mr. Turner will appear on two live television phone-in programs to discuss the Constitution and economic issues. The first is scheduled for Wednesday, Oct. 7 on Burlington Cablenet (channel 23) at 7:30 pm. The second is on Monday, Oct. 19 on Halton Cable, (channel 4) at 7:30 p.m.

Mr. Turner will also make copies of the Charlottetown Accord available from his office. The Georgetown phone number is 873-4673.

Mr. Turner warned that he may end up taking a more political role in the debate if, in his view, others use the referendum "as a means of promoting their own self interest." In that case, "I may be forced at a later date to enter the debate in a vigorous way to address any deliberate distortions."

Ms Budworth joined Milton Chamber of Commerce in 1980 and before she stepped down from the executive of that organization eight years later, she had served as president for one year.

When her term a president was coming to an end, Ms Budworth accepted an invitation to join the board of Milton District Hospital. She completed the two consecutive three-year terms in June, wrapping up her tenure with two years as chairman of the board.

It was her task to chair the largest annual hospital board meeting ever back in June of 1991. What was perceived as a move by local Pro-Life supporters to be elected to the board attracted hundreds of new members. An arena had to be rented to accommodate the crowd.

The six-year term on the board required Ms Budworth to make some "onerous mental decisions." She says the volunteer job allowed her to explore an interest in the hospital and to learn about the workings of the institution.

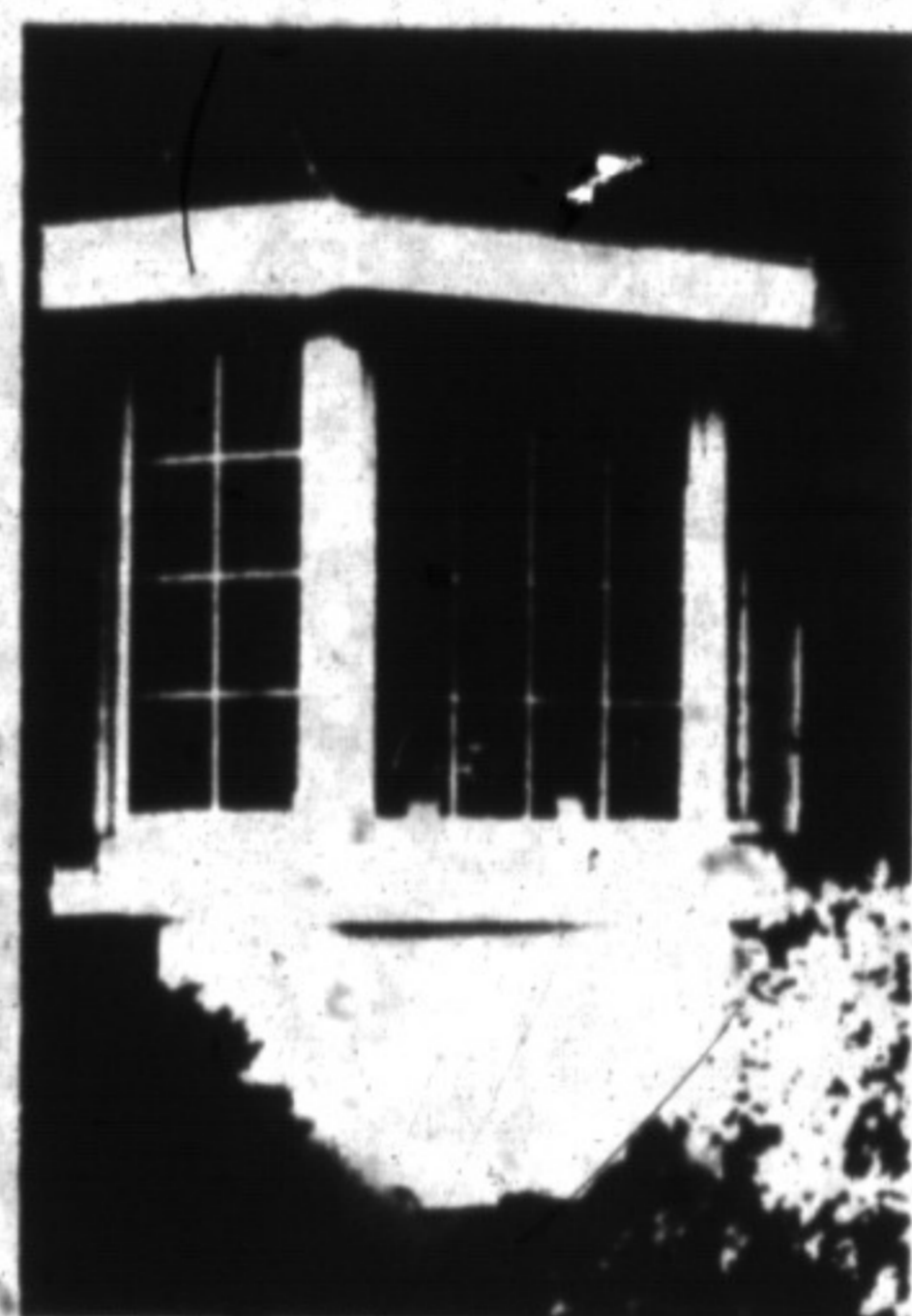
