· Born in Quebec, Mrs. Young and her late husband Benjamin, who was a veterinarian, moved to Nassagaweya in 1924. Mr. Young passed away in 1980, but his wife continued to live in their Guelph Line home until 1987.

"I found it hard when I came here," she recalls. "I was used to water." Mrs. Young was raised on her family's lakefront dairy farm with six siblings.

An honourary member of the Nassagaweya Women's Institute, Mrs. Young recalls the general store operated by the Elsley family on Guelph Line, where farmers would exchange their grain for groceries.

She also remembers a shed located north of the store where residents kept their horses while attending functions at the hall, which is now Nassagaweya Community Centre.

The arrival of Mohawk Raceway was a major controversy in Nassagaweya Township, she says. Many residents were opposed to the idea, while others, like Mrs. Young, saw it as a way to boost the local economy.

"It brought business into the township and helped the community," she recalls. "I used to like to go."

But today, she doesn't like the fact what more and more farms are disap-




