

Councillors give a grand to local jiu-jitsu team

There was no arm twisting at municipal council October 5, at least not in the literal sense, but there may be some in the future.

Bob Kranstz, Mayor Gord Krantz's brother (although he elects to spell his name differently), appeared before municipal council in an attempt to secure funding so Milton School of Jiu-Jitsu members can take part in the World Jiu-Jitsu Championships in November.

The Canadian contingent, which consistently features members of the Milton school, has either won or contended strongly for the world title each time the event has been held over the last decade or so. The championship tournament takes place every two years and is in Argentina this fall.

Council gave Mr. Kranstz, who founded and runs the Milton school, \$1,000 in support of the Canadian team's bid.

Mr. Kranstz, who will both compete and coach, hopes to take 20 athletes to the event. That will cost more than \$40,000.

The Mayor, who cast no vote on the matter since it represented a conflict of interest, still managed to get a few words in.

The last time his brother appeared before Milton council, Mr. Krantz recounted, he gave an impromptu self-defence lesson in which the Mayor was a somewhat unwilling accomplice. "I assure you, that's not going to happen again," Mr. Krantz

However, perhaps in the true tradition of siblng rivalry, Mr. Kranstz differed.

"If we win I'll come back and give a demonstration with you," he warned his brother.
