
Described below are the periods when certain hunting and discharge of firearm activities are permitted within Halton Agreement Forests, except the Coulson Tract.

Beginning October 15, 1992, through November 1, 1992 and from November 7, 1992 through December 31, 1992, inclusive, ARCHERY HUNTING will be permitted for deer and other small game (if in season).

Beginning November 2, 1992 and continuing through November 6, 1992, SHOTGUN HUNTING will be permitted for deer and other small game if in season. On these five days archery hunting is not permitted in the Agreement Forests.

Regional Council has CONTINUED the ban on hunting and the discharge of firearms within the Coulson Tract Agreement Forest (Part Lot 2, Concession 8, Town of Halton Hills).

All users of the Agreement Forests do so at their own risk and are advised to use caution during the times that hunting activity is permitted. In the event of an emergency, please call Halton Police Services at 878-5511 (north) and 825-4777 (south).
