Airport responsibility lands on Halton

business, while, temporarily at least, regional government is becoming more involved in it.

Last week Halton Region's administration and finance committee heard an update on a push to form a Local Airport Authority (LAA) to take over operation of Pearson International Airport in Mississauga.

In 1987 the federal government announced plans to shift responsibility for nationwide airport operations from Ottawa to LAA's. That has already taken place in Vancouver, Edmonton, Calgary and Montreal. A similar process is in its early stages in Toronto.

James Bulloch, a Halton Hills business executive, is a member of a temporary board set up to form an LAA. "The first role of the board will be to map out a game plan with the federal government for the transfer of project. Pearson" to local jurisdiction, he told the committee.

He sees the transition as "a unique opportunity" for the Greater Toronto Area (GTA). The Peel, York, Durham, Halton and Metro Toronto GTA councils all plan to have representation on the LAA.

While many smaller regional airports struggle, Pearson turns "a significant profit," Mr. Bulloch noted. Instead of having that money subsidize federal programs, as is now the case, the LAA's will control it.

One of the advantages for LAA's will be that they can finance projects by borrowing money, Mr. Bulloch said. Transport Canada, the federal agency which is currently running the airport, is not allowed to obtain loans and must fund its initiatives from annual budgets.

The federal government is getting out of the airport been working with the LAA group, wrote a report on the matter which accompanied Mr. Bulloch's appearance. Mr. Pomeroy said there is "some urgency" to establishing an LAA because its members should participate in ongoing discussions about terminal renovations and runway improvements.




