Police believe escaped convicts left town

Halton police say it's unlikely two prisoners who escaped from Maplehurst Correctional Centre Friday are still in this area.

"They wouldn't stick around," said Detective Constable Kevin McCart who is investigating the case.

Three convicts considered dangerous slipped through a vent in the roof of the medium-security jail at about 1 p.m.

One of the prisoners, Andrew Bartlett, 19, is back in custody after being picked up by police

Sunday on a highway near London.

Donald Francoere, 33, previously of Montreal and Peter White, 24, known to visit locations in Toronto and Brampton, are still at large.

Mr. Françoere was serving time for robbery, possession of stolen property, and attempt to obstruct justice, while Mr. White was convicted of mischief and break and enter.

Search dogs tracked the convicts to a nearby industrial area where police believe they dis-

carded their prison clothes and stole a green 1990 Ford pick-up truck bearing licence place VC3 307.

Both men missing are white. Mr. Francoere is also described as 5'8", 184 pounds, with short, light brown hair and blue eyes. Mr. White is 5'10", 184 pounds, with short, light-coloured hair and green eyes.

In other developments, the downtown business area will profit somewhat at the expense of Milton Mall, said town finance director Jim McQueen. "The tendency is for downtown taxes to go down and the tendency is for the mall taxes to increase," Mr.

McQueen told councillors.

Milton's only hard-hit sector will be the industrial one. In that area, 73 per cent of businesses or industrially zoned land will see property tax increases averaging \$1,152 per year.

Only 27 per cent of the industrial sector will get a break, but it will be a bigger one. The average decrease is \$2,527.

Purse-snatch trial delayed

The trial of a Milton man charged in connection with a purse-snatching has been moved to November 30 while police arrest a witness who failed to appear in court.

Mark Hostrawser, charged with robbery after a cyclist stole a purse from a 91-year-old woman who was walking behind a Main Street plaza September 23, will appear in court Monday.

The trial, which was originally scheduled for November 23, was postponed when the Crown's key witness subpoenaed to attend court in the case failed to show up. He has since been arrested.

Meanwhile, Mr. Hostrawser, 25, of Miles Street is in custody while awaiting trial. He was refused bail after being arrested October 14.

The elderly victim was walking behind Carriage Square toward Martin Street to pay a bill at a nearby bank when the cyclist rode up from behind and grabbed her purse.

The woman was hysterical after the incident. She injured her wrist when the strap was pulled from her hand, and was taken to hospital by ambulance. Her purse contained
