Second escapee captured

A second convict who escaped from Maplehurst Correctional Centre November 20 is back behind bars.

Peter White, 24, was captured by Metropolitan Toronto Police in the food court area of the Eaton's Centre shodly before 8 p.m. Sunday.

He was serving time for mischief and break and enter when he escaped from the medium-security jail through a vent in the roof with two other prisoners.


Andrew Barlett, 19, was picked up by police two days after the escape along a Highway near London.

Police believe the prisoners made their way to a nearby industrial park, discarded their prison clothes, and stole green 1996 Ford pick-up truck bearing licence plate VC3

Still at large is Donald Franpreviously of Montreal. He was serving time for robbery, possession of stolen property, and attempt to obstruct justice.

The convict is described as white, 5'8", 184 pounds, with short, light brown hair and blue eyes.




Bishop Rediring captured the Halton senior girls basketball title last Tuesday beating M. M. Robinson.

Death threat charges laid

side a Milton courtroom Monday hind a downtown plaza Sept. 23. for allegedly threatening to kill a key witness in a robbery case.

Her boyfriend, Mark Hostrawser, 25, of Miles Street, who is charged in the robbery, also allegedly threatened the witness with bodily harm if he testified in court

Halton police arrested Melanie Livingstone, 18, of Bronte Street as she was walking out of Milton provincial division court where Mr. Hostrawser had just appeared on robbery and theft charges.

The witness, who had to be arrested last week after failing to show up in court, is expected to testify in the robbery case involving a 91-year-old Milton woman.

Police said the witness received a phone call after 8 p.m. November 9 from a man who threatened him with bodily harm if he testified. Three weeks later, a woman came to his place of employment threatening to have him beaten and killed.

Livingstone has charged with uttering a death threat, obstructing police, and breach of probation. She was held for a bail hearing yesterday.

Mr. Hostrawser, who is in custody, faces charges of uttering a death threat, and obstructing police in addition to robbery and two theft charges. He is scheduled to appear in court tomorrow.
