Hundreds surrender their weapons in amnesty

More than 800 handguns and rifles, and campaign," said regional police spokesman 20,000 rounds of ammunition were among the Sgt. Joe Martin. firearms collected by Halton police in its amnesty program.

Knives, bayonets, machetes and hand grenades were also surrendered at police headquarters in the program which allowed citizens to dispose of their illegal weapons without fear of being charged.

"If one life has been saved or one accident prevented by the campaign, then it has been a very worthwhile exercise for the entire community."

Halton police destroyed the majority of the weapons, while hand grenades and other military ordnance were forwarded to the "Overall, we feel it has been a very effective Department of National Defence for disposal.

Sgt. Martin said the Halton Regional Police Service is "pleased" with the results of the program/ "It is quite comforting for residents to have the opportunity to have unwanted firearms destroyed with no fear of reprisal."

Citizens were permitted to drop off their weapons without being charged, except where firearms were suspected of being used in a

The program ended December 15.

Wreaths stolen from cemetery

Several wreaths have been stolen from grave sites at Evergreen Cemetery over the past two weeks, leaving family members who laid the floral decorations in disgust.

At least 18 wreaths have been reported missing from the nonprofit cemetery on Ontario Street, said Roy Downs, secretarytreasurer of the board of directors which operates the site.

The winter wreaths, used by loved ones to decorate the grave sites, started disappearing at the beginning of December, he said.

The cemetery board has received several phone calls from distraught family members wondering what has happened to their wreaths, which are usually placed on stands by the head stones.

The 16-acre property has no other security than a superintendent who works during the day said Mr. Downs.

He is urging the thieves to return the wreaths. Mr. Downs speculated whoever stole the plastic floral monuments may be trying to resell them. They range in price from \$30 to \$60.

Anyone with information is asked to contact police.

Purse snatch suspect found guilty by judge

A 25-year-old Miles Street man has been found guilty of stealing a purse from an elderly woman behind a downtown plaza in September.

Mark Hostrawser was convicted of theft in Milton provincial division court Monday.

Judge John Robinson ruled he had "no doubt" Mr. Hostrawser admitted to stealing the purse as told to the court by 21-year-old witness Shayne Woodhouse earlier this month.

Mr. Woodhouse, who read about the purse-snatching in a newspaper, testified December 7 he heard Mr. Hostrawser tell his girlfriend he committed the crime.

In the defence's submission to

Hostrawser's lawyer, Leonard Walker, argued the evidence was hearsay and said the witness lacked credibility.

He said Mr. Woodhouse has a criminal record and, because he violated probation in the past, had a history of lying in court.

But Judge Robinson said he was "satisfied" with the evidence provided by Mr. Woodhouse.

Crown Attorney Laurie Jago said newspaper articles on the crime described a 15-year-old boy as a possible suspect in the case — a speculation police later ruled out.

The 91-year-old victim, who has a-heart condition and-bad eyesight, was walking behind Carriage Square toward Martin Street when Mr. Hostrawser rode up from be-
