#### September

Milton hired a new town administrator in early September. David Hipgraye, an engineer and accountant, was scheduled to start work in October. He had been working as chief of staff to Metro Toronto chairman Alan Tonks.

#### October

The Town privatized its garbage collection service with a decision in early October. It's to be a cost-cutting move, to take effect with the new year. Browning Ferris Industries landed the contract. 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

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
