# DATELINE Real estate sales down from last January

"Slow and Steady" is the word for real estate this month with figures from the Oakville, Milton and District Real Estate Board (OMDREB) showing January's overall sales were down slightly from a year ago.

A total of 122 properties changed hands last month, compared with 143 in January, 1992 and 141 in December, 1992. The dollar sales volume last month was \$20 million, 17 per cent lower than the \$24.1 million recorded in January, 1992, and 14 per cent lower thatn December's total of \$23.3 million.

"December and January are traditionally the slowest months of the year in real estate," notes OMDREB president, Richard Weima. Many people are preoccupied with holiday preparations — and the cost of paying for them — and cold

weather can also act as a deterrent to shopping for a new home.

"This year, we have the added complication of an economy that is still in transistion and suspect many people are concerned about their finances. Discretionary moves may not be a very strong part of the market yet," he adds.

"In fact, that's emphasized by the fact that fewer properties came on the market during January than we usually expect to see: the OMDREB processed 537 new listings last month compared to 648 in January, 1992, 680 in the same month of 1991 and 886 in 1990. There were 569 new listings processed in the Oakville/Milton area in January, 1989."

Mr. Weima said although sales figures for the total area are down, sales activity in the Town of Oakville alone has remained fairly constant, with 73 residential sales last month, compared with 72 in January, 1992 and 78 in December.


"That could be because the market is favoring

first-time buyers now and the supply of entry-level homes in the rural and outlying communities of our Board is very limited," he says. "Sales ap-- peared to pick up towards the latter part of the month, however, and that could translate into a stronger market in February. We'll be watching to see what happens with great interest, especially as we move into the traditional spring market."

"Some properties obviously take longer to sell than others," he says. "Anyone who needs to sell quickly should price their property at the lower end of the price range suggested by an OMDREB sales person."

"Our members receive detailed information on the list and sale prices of every property listed with a member of our Board on a daily basis," Mr. Weima notes. "That information represents an important benefit to vendors and purchasers alike, and we're pleased to be able to supply it."


