from OUR READERS on page 7 sector developer commonly builds.

6. Mr. Kelly's final question was: how big is Halton Non-Profit Housing Corporation, how many homes does it control, how big is the staff, what is the operating budget, how much money comes from the Region, why is their lawyer from Toronto, how big are these homes, what is the market value and what is the cost per square foot to build these units?

Halton Non-Profit Housing Corporation currently manages 431 homes with a four full time staff who are responsible for management, administration, resident relations and maintenance. Two other staff are employed to develop new housing communities. A further 158 units will be starting construction this spring.

We operate on a strictly break even basis. Our costs are completely recovered from revenues from residents and operating subsidies from the Ministry of Housing. Our operating budgets are approved by the Ministry of Housing on an annual basis. No tax dollars from Halton Region support the operation of the Corporation.

The lawyer Mr. Kelly referred to is

the developer's lawyer. The Region provides legal services to the Corporation on a cost recovery basis. Occasionally an outside legal firm may be used for specific legal expertise. The average size of a three bedroom townhouse is 1,150 square feet, which will rent for approximately \$980 per month at market value. Our building costs in 1992 were \$63 per square foot.

The Corporation is successful in providing modest, affordable housing to people in need in Halton. My regret is that there are many families in Milton who need affordable housing, who we have not been able to


