Feedback Canada needs a hand — many hands — to help harvest surplus crops which are fed back to local food banks including Milton's Salvation Army.

The Georgetown-based program is involved in developing community gardens, accessing surplus or seconds from grocery stores and farmers markets as well as harvesting donated crops. Milton Farmers market participants will be among the suppliers this season.

Volunteers who assist in the harvest at any time throughout the season receive a percentage of the harvest. Those who use food banks are especially encouraged to do their part.

Community garden plots are currently established in Burlington and Georgetown and a similar operation may begin this season in Milton. Again, food bank users are encouraged to take on their own gardens at these sites.

Anyone can get involved in the garden plots but it is hoped onetenth of the food harvested will be donated to Feedback.

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cated they were prepared to see him remain in office.

"I have no problem with Mr. Pomeroy staying on as regional chairman," said Burlington councillor Ralph Scholtens.

"There would have to be a lot more information to lead me to believe he should step down," Milton Mayor Gord Krantz said. "I certainly support him staying on." Informal discussions with other regional councillors show

"general support" for that

"It's not for me to say" if Mr. Pomeroy should withdraw from office, Burlington mayor Walter Mulkewich said. "It's a personal decision." However, "he's innocent until proven guilty," he added.

"I think he needs to be extended the courtesy of some time to think through what his preference will be," said Oakville Mayor Ann Mul-

Only Halton Hills regional councillor Bill Robson has so far said Mr. Pomeroy should step down, with pay, "until this is resolved."

Halton regional chief administrative officer John Burke said the situation would be different if regional officials had discovered wrongdoing firsthand, but as matters stand, "it's an allegation."

Ms Crimmins, who is his subordinate, is also "going to continue her functions," as long as she wishes, Mr. Burke said.



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
