# Region plans to enforce 'odd-even' lawn watering days

Lawn watering restrictions enforced by Halton Region come into effect next month and continue throughout the summer.

Local homeowners with odd-numbered municipal addresses (1, 3, 5, etc.) will be permitted to water their lawns only on odd calendar days.

Properties with even-numbered municipal addresses will be allowed to water their lawns on even calendar days.

For townhouse units where the unit number is included in the municipal address (Unit 101, 2 Main St.), the unit number will apply (the odd 101, not the even 2).

As in previous years, the program is implemented on a Region-wide basis for all properties serviced by municipal water supplies. Private wells and surface water from ponds and streams are excluded from the program.

The water restriction program includes all residential, commercial and industrial properties; all municipally owned properties such as schools, parks, arenas, community centres, public works facilities, and golf courses using municipal water.

The program doesn't include the

following: car washing; flower, garden and tree watering by hand; water uses via hand held spray nozzles; newly placed sodding during the maintenance period; lawns treated with herbicide, pesticide, or fertilizer which require water.

Halton Public Works staff is enforcing the program. Violaters may receive a \$2,000 fine under the

Regional Water Use Bylaw 93-89. Excess water demand due to lawn watering can strain the capacity of water supplies and storage systems, according to the Region.

 Average lawn watering for one. half-hour a day uses 360 gallons of

In Milton, there are 8,200 homes.

· If all these homes watered on the same day, more than 2.9 million gallons of water would be used.

Water conservation will reduce the amount of water being used by everyone, and therefore reduce the amount of water being treated and & pumped. This will minimize the strain on the regional water systems and reduce the cost to residents on their water and sewer bill.
