# Town could face \$290,000 in payroll cuts

Proposed provincial legislation aimed at slicing \$2 billion from public sector wages will probably mean a \$290,000 cutback for the Town of Milton, senior municipal officials said Tuesday.

"We will lose \$290,000 in grants," said David Hipgrave, Milton's chief administrative officer. The legislation forces municipalities to make the reductions from their payrolls, so they will be permanent. Money cannot be taken from other projects to fill the

Asked what morale was like among Milton's 100 municipal employees, Mr. Hipgrave said they view the situation as "pretty serious. No one wants to have their wages cut or be laid off. These are very serious discussions."

The provincial government has given Ontario's 950,000 public sector

workers until August 1 to trim the \$2 billion, otherwise Queen's Park will do it by unilaterally chopping transfers to municipalities, schools, for health care

and by scaling back funding for the provincial civil ser-

Under the provincial outline, wages would be frozen for three years and 12 days of unpaid leave would be imposed on employees.

If each of the umbrella bargaining sectors involved in the cutbacks - municipalities for example — can

come to an agreement with the provincial government prior to the August 1 deadline, the cutbacks will be lessened by 20 per cent, according to a Toronto Star report.

"If we don't have an agreement, then the provisions will come into place," said Mr. Hipgrave, who sits on the board of the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO), the group negotiating with the province on behalf of more than 700 municipalities.



Milton has no fire chief at **David Hipgrave** 

present, nor a planning director. Recruitment has been ongoing for both positions, but Harold Penson has been the acting fire chief for months and John Fior the acting planning director for more than a year.

The latest news is the second provincial funding drop to face Milton and all Ontario municipalities in recent

months. The expenditure control plan, the other element in the provincial twopronged cutback strategy, cost Milton approximately \$75,000.

from capital projects, rather than personnel costs. Milton scrapped some sidewalk repairs and other road work to make budget.

McQueen warned that not

only is the lost funding "never coming back", but "the (provincial) government may take more money next year or the year after that," if deficits continue to loom large.

Milton's overall municipal payroll is roughly \$7 million a year.

# Howard. seeks to gag 'old hens'

There's too much fooling around in the meetings town councillors hold behind closed doors, says Ward 3 representative Marion Howard.

Portions of meetings closed to the public, called in-camera sessions, "really upset me," Ms Howard told town council's general committee Monday night. "It's like an old hen's picnic.

Councillors should "cut back on the jokes," stop "speaking off topic" and "asking irrelevant questions" of staff members, councillor Howard added. They should also refrain from 'duplicating, triplicating, quadruplicating" the remarks of others when they have the floor.

Ms Howard said she felt frustrated over such activities recently while acting as meeting chairperson, a duty that rotates among councillors on a monthly basis. She was reluctant to impose her will then, but "the next time I'm up there I'm going to be setting my own rules" based on "common sense," she warned.

The discussion sprang from a push by Ms Howard, which her colleagues endorsed Monday, to have municipal staff at least examine the possibility of adopting a set of rules and procedures for meetings, called a procedural bylaw.

Councillors informally follow Roberts Rules of Order, a universal guidebook to meeting procedure, but often deviate from the text guidelines to, for instance, make impromptu speeches during times set aside for questions.

Howard said "misconception" has arisen regarding her request for a procedural bylaw in the wake of a public meeting. several weeks ago over a controversial housing proposal. It dragged on until well after midnight. But the councillor said she was more con-

cerned about in-camera activities. Ward 1 councillor Rick Day said he would supprt councillor Howard's motion, but cautioned against veering toward too much regulation of speak-

A former Oakville councillor, Mr. Day said a similar push there meant that "people played all kinds of games" that "led to factions" developing on council as those with opposing views attempted to use procedural rules to influence debate.

Mayor Gord Krantz too said councillors should tread softly so as to "not get bogged down in spending half our time talking about procedures and policies."

Additionally, if council imposes a 10:30 p.m. curfew on its Monday meetings, as some jurisdictions have done, it could easily mean meeting again the next night or the next two nights, he warned.

Should council put time limits on presentations, it may prove unwieldy at public meetings, where input from constituents is solicited, Mr. Krantz added. For example, if members of the public are told after speaking for five minutes "to sit down and shut up," then "it will be interesting to see" their reactions, he noted. "Good luck."

Mr. Krantz is also a Halton regional councillor. There is a procedural bylaw at Halton council and yet representatives still "get bogged down for half an hour at a time."

Ward 2 councillor John Challinor was squarely behind Ms Howard. "I commend councillor Howard for bringing this forward. What councillor Howard is asking for is common sense.
