Mulvale captures Tory nod for PCs in Oakville-Milton

Tory memberships, Ms O'Connor said, and was assuming two thirds of them would appear to back the Oakville mayor.

Bob Tye ran Mr. Sparling's campaign. His workers sold 1,000 memberships, he said. Phone polling had, he believed, nailed down a high percentage of those voters as Sparling supporters.

He was assuming only 15 per cent of them were less than solidly behind his candidate.

As to Ms Mulvale's yellow scarves being draped around so many election. deleagates' necks, Mr. Tye put on an optimistic public face. "It does not effect me at all." Delegates "could just be collecting memorabilia."

The major tension throughout the campaign revolved around questioning the depth of Ms Mulvale's commitment to the Progressive Conservative party.

Some Sparling supporters had depicted her as an opportunist, and touted Mr. Sparling's longtime PC involvement as far the stronger set of Tory credentials.

That argument held sway with Janet Mitchell, a former Oakville regional councillor who dropped out of what turned into the Mulvale-Sparling contest relatively early.

Ms Mitchell said she supported Mr. Sparling because "Stephen is a PC. I don't believe for a minute Ann is. She's a card-carrying PC but I don't believe she's a philosophical

Jackie Cutmore, the other early contender who withdrew from the race, was more circumspect. Ms Cutmore did not want to say publicly whom she supported. But when Mr. Sparling entered the room, she rose with his contingent and clapped.

A prominent Milton Tory with longstanding roots in the party had no problem supporting Ms Mulvale, however.

In fact, Milton Mayor Gord Krantz sat with her family in the front row at the meeting and seconded her nomination.

"She's the one I have my money on, not only tonight, but also when the election's called," Mr. Krantz said. He downplayed comparisons of PC involvement between Ms Mulvale and Mr. Sparling, saying Ms Mulvale, like most municipal politicians, attempted to steer clear of becoming "embroiled in party

politics."

Mr. Krantz also defended Ms Mulvale ideologically, saying "she's no socialist, far from it. But she's a progressive person. A Progressive Conservative."

On policy, Ms Mulvale said she wants to "decrease and ultimately dismiss the (annual) deficit," as a "high priority." She also hopes to see "a federal-provincial economic plan" put in place "quickly."

Mr. Sparling publicly pledged Ms Mulvale "my support and my
