Always completely remove the cover before using your pool or spe, to avoid the possibillity of anyone - especially a small child - being trapped and drowning under the cover.

7. Drain any standing water from the surface of your pool or spe cover. An intent or small child can drown in even the smallest amount of water.

If you use any of the lightweight, floating pool or spa covers, be especially alert for the potential for drowning accidents. These covers are not for safety, and no one should ever crawl or walk on them.
