#### Crash victim still critical

A Hillsburgh man remains in critical condition following a vehicle crash on single-Steeles Avenue early Sunday morning.

Halton police said the was westbound on vehicle Steeles Avenue near Wheelabrator Way when it crossed into the eastbound lane and went off the south shoulder of the roadway.

The vehicle went through a fence and down an embankment, striking a cement bridge support, and came to a rest on the opposite side of a small creek.

The Milton Fire Department rescued the trapped occupant, who was the only person in the car. He was taken to Milton District Hospital and then transferred by air ambulance to Toronto.

Jason Sharkey, 24, was listed in critical condition at St. Michael's Hospital yesterday morning. An investigation into the accident by the regional traffic bureau is continuing.




