





## PC candidate Ann Mulvale wants to shape change in Ottawa

There are those who believe a victory by Oakville Mayor Ann Mulvale in the federal election would actually be a loss, suggesting that a valuable and dedicated public servant would be swallowed by the partisan Ottawa political maze.

The Progressive Conservative candidate for Oakville-Milton has heard this concern, but isn't buying it for a minute.

"There is a view that Ann Mulvale is needed here, but I can effect more change by being (in Ottawa) than by not being there," she says. "I'm stepping out of my established comfort level, but you can sit on the sidelines or you can get involved."

The electorate's apprehension about the future is a feeling Ms Mulvale is well acquainted with, but she maintains inner strength, not self-pity, is the answer.

Ms Mulvale doesn't take credit for all her accomplishments, however, explaining how they have been dependent on "the empowerment of others." Her "focusssed and committed" campaign team is fiercely loyal and her appeal among voters ranges from unionized autoworkers to white collar commuters.

"Very few people on my campaign team are working against something. They are working for something, the vision we can claim," she says.

One example of that support, she says, is the strategic placement—rather than sheer numbers—of her election signs.

"We're not winning the battle of signs on public property. We're winning the battle of signs on people's lawns." Ms Mulvale maintains a Tory majority is still a strong possibility. "This riding is very winnable and this country is winnable."

Ms Mulvale started her political career in 1977 as chair of an Oakville residents association. In 1980 she was elected as a Halton regional councillor from Oakville.

In 1985 she made an unsuccessful bid for the Oakville mayor's office, running second to Bill Perras. She won the seat in 1988, and in 1991 was acclaimed for a second three-year term.

As for her sometimes controversial affiliation with the Progressive Conservative Party, she maintains that is a non-issue. "I wasn't always a PC, but I wasn't always a Canadian." However, "I defy you to find one more passionate."


## Badminton, anyone?
