New federal ridings cause concern

"I don't see the point. I liked the way it was. We had a chance of change things in Oakville," said Mr. Shillington. "This allows the old-core Oakvillians to protect the status quo."

Since the boundaries are based on population, Mr. Shillington wondered whether the Commission would turn around and downsize again if a few major industries packed up and left and took their employees with them.

Mr. Shillington said the changes will force local political parties to sever existing ties — such as those between Oakville and Milton — and establish new riding associations and bureaucracies. The new MP for Halton Centre, for example, may even have to set up more than one constituency office in order to deal with the expansive geography of the riding.

"But will we be served any better?" he asked.

Richard Malboeuf, a Milton resident who ran for the Reform Party in the last federal election, agrees restructuring is needed, but said he has "mixed feelings" about the end result.

"Government is too big now," said Mr. Malbeouf.
"The restructuring would add MPs to an already inflated House of Commons."

As for whether several constituency offices will materialize in the large Halton Centre, Mr. Malbeouf said Milton residents are used to being under-represented. After all, he said, former Oakville-Milton MP Otto Jelinek never set up an office in the north during his entire career and so far neither has current Liberal MP Bonnie Brown.

Having been through this process once before, Ms Brown said she's optimistic about changing the proposed boundaries, which she characterized as "ridiculous."

In 1983 the Commission orginally proposed a riding which encompassed parts of Oakville as well as Burlington to the west and Mississauga to the east. As president of the local Liberal association at the time, Ms Brown thought it ludicrous to cross regional or even municipal borders and made a case — as did other parties — to push north. The result was the current Oakville-Milton riding.

"I've been through that experience so I'm not terribly upset with the first draft," said Ms Brown, who doesn't like the Upper Middle Road limit one bit.

Still, she plans to meet with representatives from the different area riding associations and the chief electoral officer to see if a consensus can be reached and a united presentation made to the Commission.

In the meantime, Ms Brown said she will speak to her fellow MP's, many of whom are not happy with the new boundaries either.

Like the NDP's Gary Shillington, Ms Brown is concerned this may not be the appropriate time to add seats and incur the costs associated with four more MP's.

If the Commission did the unlikely and decided to forego any changes, however, the status quo would remain unfair to those members who currently represent huge geographic ridings.

"We need to address glaring areas where reform needs to be made but decide whether it needs to be done everywhere," she said.
