

# Deals may loom for scarce water rights in Milton

Slowly, steadily Halton regional and Town of Milton officials are moving toward shaking loose water

service capacity from lands which have it but remain undeveloped.

At Wednesday's regional planning and public works committee meeting it was decided more time was

needed to develop agreements to loan or sell water service capacity. The issue was deferred to allow representatives from Milton, Halton Region, landowner groups and the public to find solutions.

Howard Mott, a solicitor for several development groups along Highway 401 in Milton, suggested agreements would be difficult to engineer without firm commitments on full water servicing through the Halton Urban Structure Review. Eventually, water for a greatly expanded Milton is to be piped north from Lake Ontario.

Mr. Mott indicated there were legal questions regarding the commitment to provide water for various land parcels designated for industrial development.

During Mr. Mott's presentation to committee it quickly became apparent that his many questions could not be answered during the meeting.

"I suspect everyone knows why I'm here with guns smoking," said Milton Mayor Gord Krantz, who sat in on the meeting. "There are 50 people really wanting to know what's going on. We have to keep the public aware of what's going on, of what's coming down the pipe, no pun intended."

"I don't want plans or expansions held up any longer than they bloody well have to," said Milton councillor Brad Clements, to the deferral.

He suggested sections of the regional plan for servicing that were not under contention be moved forward.

Mr. Clements also complained that interested parties were "being bounced from Milton to the region and back again" when it came to looking for information.

"No one will argue that Milton has capacity problems," said Milton councillor Barry Lee. "But we are still in business. Ten per cent of our

capacity is still open."

The committee chair, Halton Hills' Marilyn Serjeantson, said all agreements to loan or sell water service capacity were done on a voluntary basis.

Mr. Mott alluded to some gentle arm-twisting in other recent development projects.

The issue will resurface in several weeks after interested groups have had the opportunity to resolve their differences.

staff are short. You only have to look at the volume of overtime and standby time and on-call time that the staff of the SIU accumulates."

Mr. Harding says changes to provincial legislation are also needed to explain and clarify differences between "subject" and "suspect" police officers so officers don't feel an accusing finger is being automatically pointed at them by the SIU.

"One of the main reasons for today's delays is the constitutional issue. Subject officers have been advised by various lawyers in this province of ours not to say anything. Some of them, I understand, now are even telling police officers not to maintain notebooks."

Just three weeks on the job, Mr.

Harding says he has begun to write out a manual of operation procedures and he has drafted a basic strategic plan, which will soon be debated by staff.

He has also contacted chiefs of major police forces across Ontario and police association presidents to pass on his telephone numbers.

"I've told them I want to be available to them as much as I possibly can to address their needs and concerns."

Mr. Harding says his new job is different in many ways from his former command position at Halton police.

"My command responsibilities are significantly diminished. I don't have to worry about 600 people now."

"I don't have to be the one to have the last say about what goes into the budget and how it's presented and go through the agony of making that presentation."

However, Mr. Harding says in some ways his new job is similar to his former one.

"You've still got a leadership responsibility. You've still got a management responsibility. You've still got a human relations responsibility."

"You've still got a responsibility to serve the public to the best of your ability because ultimately in our organization, just like the police service, it is the public we serve."
