## Speaker says environment is good news for business

Halton and adjacent regions could be the major beneficiaries of Canada's first international environmental business initiatives, the president of McMaster University told area business people recently.

Dr. Geraldine Kenney-Wallace said the key to solving so many of the environmental problems facing society was the application of successful local solutions in partnership with government.

"We have to take a long-term view. We have to work in partnership, share the risks, share the costs and get to the solutions faster," said Dr. Kenney-Wallace.

The high international stakes and "the complexity of the subject means that you can't go it alone," she told the Mayor's Business Breakfast audience in Oakville.

Dr. Kenney-Wallace said good ethics obviously make good business sense, but the key is to see what can be learned from history and combine that with community issues, then build an interlocking relationship. A strong bond should lead to both job and wealth creation, she added.

"We know other countries are seeking to do it, particularly the Asia-Pacific countries," said Dr. Kenney-Wallace. As well, there has been "an irreversible shift from being solely dependent on resources by industry into a mind-driven economy."

"Everyone has a stake in the investment," she noted.

Dr. Kenney-Wallace said both local and national environmental experts would be brainstorming on relevant topics during Environmental Excellence Week in Hamilton (May 2-6). She hoped it would lead to a national conference on environmental issues.

### NOTICE OF PRE-HEARING CONFERENCE

IN THE MATTER OF sections 137, 140 and 144 of the Environmental Protection Act, as amended,

-and-

IN THE MATTER OF an application by E. Cummins & Sons Ltd., Eugene Cummins and Shirley Anne Cummins dated February 18, 1994, for a hearing before the Environmental Appeal Board with respect to the order of the Director, Central Region, Ministry of Environment and Energy. The Director's order prohibits the deposit of any further waste, including any waste from construction and demolition sites, on the property described as the southeast half of the southwest half of Lot 2, in the Regional Municipality of Halton and requires a geophysical survey, excavation of any areas where the geophysical survey indicates the presence of significant amounts of metal and the removal of such metal, a program to characterize the quality of the surface and subsurface soils, and a hydrogeological study of the property.

A pre-hearing conference will be held on April 29, 1994 at 9:30 a.m. in the Council Chambers, Victoria Park Square, Town of Milton.

The purpose of this pre-hearing conference is to:

- a) identify parties;
- b) define, formulate or simplify issues;
- c) clarify, amplify or limit an application, intervention or reply;
- d) decide the procedure to be adopted in this proceeding;
- e) disclose evidence, including
  - i) identifying documents the parties intend to rely on;
  - ii) exchanging or arranging for the exchange of documents among parties;
  - iii) identifying witnesses, the nature of their evidence, and their order of presentation;
  - iv) considering the advantages and disadvantages of filing witness statements and interrogatories and establishing a procedure for their service and filing if needed;
- f) set the date and place for commencement of the hearing;
- g) estimate the length of the hearing;
- h) decide any other matters that may aid in the simplification or most just disposition of the proceeding;
- i) consider the possibility of settlement of any or all of the issues in the proceeding and;
- j) for any other purpose that the Board deems appropriate.

Any person who wants to participate at the hearing of this appeal should attend this pre-hearing conference to advise the Board of his or her interest.

If you want to participate in the hearing or receive notice of the hearing but you cannot attend the pre-hearing conference, please advise the Board Secretary in writing of your interest.

If you require the assistance of an interpreter, or any other assistance, or the pre-hearing conference to be conducted in the French language, please advise the Board Secretary as soon as you receive this notice, and the Board will try to accommodate your need.

If you do not respond to this notice or indicate to the Board Secretary that you wish to participate in the hearing, the Environmental Appeal Board may proceed in your absence and you will not be entitled to any further notice in the proceedings. DATED at TORONTO, this 18th day of April, 1994.

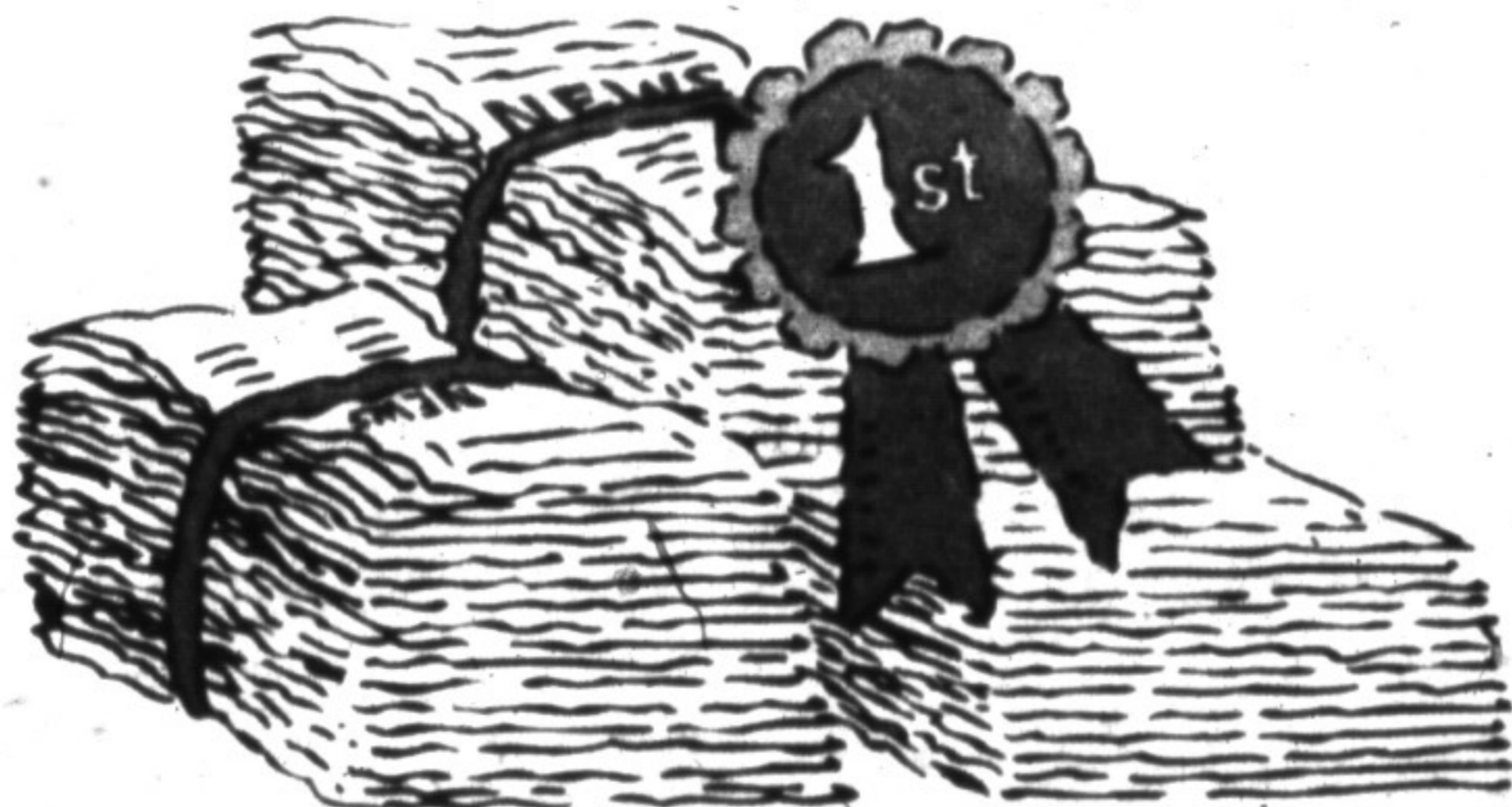
