MDHS bows out to Burlington

The Milton District High School baseball team was undefeated heading into their Halton semifinal encounter with Burlington's Notre Dame last Friday at Brian Best Park. But then the wheels fell off and they found a new opponent to beat — themselves.

It happens to the best of teams, and make no mistake about it, the Mustangs proved themselves to be one of the best with their 7-0-1 record before the game. But uncharacteristic fielding and mental mistakes were their downfall, and they came out on the short end of a 5-4 extrainning decision.

Adam Flatt started on the mound for Milton and pitched a gutsy four innings, the maximum allowable in high school games. He battled every hitter, getting all but one of his outs via the ground ball or the strikeout route.

Notre Dame jumped out to a first-inning lead on a walk, stolen base and opposite field chunker. Milton came back in the bottom of the second after catcher Kevin Wilson barely see the ball, much less hit it. walked and was replaced by courtesy runner Jimmy Fay (allowed for catchers to give them time to put on the equipment). He stole second and then went to third on a passed ball. Pat Lynch drove him home with a solid single to left.

Notre Dame got three unearned runs in the third on fielding errors by Milton, one on an errant pickoff attempt and two more on an overthrow of first base.

Down 4-1 in the bottom of the fifth, Milton mounted their comeback, thankful to have Notre Dame's starting pitcher out of the game. Mark McPhail led off with a solid double to right, and with one out, Shayne Ridley hit a grounder to the shortstop, who lifted his glove and watched it go between his legs. That brought McPhail home to make it 4-2. Shayne Ferrier then drove one to centre over the fielder's head for a triple to bring Milton within one.

The tying run was the result of some aggressive play by Ferrier. Fay hit a dribbler to third with the runner going on contact. Caught up between third and home, Ferrier

stopped and then decided his only chance was to go for it, so he went full speed toward the catcher and knocked him into the twilight zone, shaking the ball loose and touching the plate with his hand.

Meanwhile, Ferrier replaced Flatt on the mound to start the fifth, and delivered his usual outstanding effort. He struck out five of the first six batters and didn't allow a hit over his first three innings. Notre Dame batters could

Into-extra innings, however, Notre Dame struck in the top of the eighth with a long fly ball to deep center that allowed the runner to go to third. He came home on an opposite-field hit to give Notre Dame the 5-4 lead.

Fay led off the bottom of the eighth for Milton District with a smash off the shoulder of the third baseman Wilson hit one to the second baseman, who threw it out into left field trying to get the lead runner at second. That put runners on the corners with Lynch at bat and none out. He hit a fly ball to left, not deep enough, however, to take a chance on the runner tagging and going home with still only one out. Next, with Flatt at the plate, Fay raced for home in a squeeze attempt and was dead on arrival because Flatt had somehow missed the sign.

Manager Tim Black was philosophical about the missed sign and the loss, and felt badly for Flatt, an integral part of the team's success this year, who was clearly upset with himself. "These things happen — it's baseball, not life or death."
