Town living options open for comment

Two open houses at Town Hall July 13 and 19 will give Milton residents a chance to review three different land use options that could be used to plan Milton's future.

Town officials took advantage of Monday's public meeting on Destiny Milton to put the three options out for feedback for the first time. The plans will also be displayed at Town Hall.

Town council hopes to select one option July 20 and by the fall the first draft of a new Official Plan should be out for public review.

Liz Howsen, a project consultant, said the three options divide Milton into "perspectives".

The integrated option puts employment and living areas as close together as possible. "They're not side-by-side but they bring employment areas within walking distance of each other," said Ms Howsen.

The corridor option puts employment lands along the major transportation corridors, while the consolidated land use option separates employment use lands clearly away from residential areas in what Ms Howsen said is a more "traditional, post-war" planning style.

Ms Howsen said it's up to Milton to decide what style development should take.

"You may want to live and work in the same area or you may find you don't want industry or office buildings in your residential area for your own reasons, that you prefer to drive across town to go to work," outlined Ms Howsen.

"It's a focus for discussion. It's not perfect, it's a long way from being perfect," added Ms Howsen, noting detailed policies will be dealt with during detailed planning next fall.
