## Residents turning in many. weapons during amnesty

More weapons are being turned in at police stations across the province. Nearly 2,000 items have been gathered by law enforcement agencies in Ontario at the midway point of the provincial firearms amnesty program.

By the end of the sixth week of the 13-week program, which began June 1, 1,880 weapons of varying sorts had been dropped off by citizens to the OPP and other police services around the province.

Individuals surrendering weapons to police are free from prosecution, as long as the guns haven't been used in a crime.

As of July 9 the breakdown of weapons accumulated was as follows: 598 non-restricted rifles; 419 handguns; 302 shotguns; 216 "near" firearms, such as crossbows, machetes, mace and martial arts apparatus and 170 explosive devices. Nearly 60,000 bullets and shotgun shells have also been taken in.

Weapons can be taken to any police service in Ontario until August 31.



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
