On equity

Trustees defer policy paper

Trustees of the Halton Board of Education voted recently to send their "groundbreaking" equity policy to the Ontario Human Rights Commission for input and feedback before approving it.

The document, which was presented to trustees by superintendent of policy and planning Rae Stoness in May of this year, was deferred after a motion by Burlington Trustee Lynda Schreiber suggested the board take advantage of this "free consultative service."

Despite Mr. Stoness' concern that the document, if forwarded to the Human Rights Commission, wouldn't be returned in time to meet the Ministry of Education's

deadline, trustees voted in favor of doing so.

The Equity policy was drafted after it was deemed the board's original equity policy was incomplete.

A steering committee was established to embellish guidelines and "develop new equity policy as necessary to reflect the expectations of the Ontario Human Rights Code."

The policy covers the areas of employment, recruitment and promotion, staff development, curriculum and instruction and plant.

The policy must be in the Ministry's hands sometime during the next school year.
