Cops ask for road courtesy

The Milton OPP is asking motorists to use "common sense" during their travels over the Labour Day weekend.

Eighteen people died in 12 vehicle collisions on Ontario roads over the holiday weekend last year, said Cst. Dave Thomas.

"The majority of these accidents resulted from aggressive driver behaviour and were preventable."

The OPP recommends drivers allow more travel time, display more patience, be courteous to other drivers, keep a safe distance between vehicles and wear seatbelts.


Composter sale

The Town of Milton will once again this year sell home composting units to residents for \$15 each.


Samples of the green or black Earth Machine home composters are on display at the Victoria Square Town Hall.

New this year will be a free tire drop-off, still in the works with a recycling firm. That will be available to all residents whether or not they purchase a composter.

Future unclear as Pomeroy trial date set for new year

Halton Regional Chair Peter Pomeroy says he's disappointed he won't have a chance to clear his name before the November municipal election.

The first of two trials Mr. Pomeroy faces on corruption charges has been set for January 17. 1980s.

Referring to his reputation, he said, "It's important for me to clear it in any event," outside the courtroom yesterday. "Unfortunately, we don't set the agenda."

Mr. Pomeroy said he has not yet decided if he will seek re-appointment as regional chair.

The chair is selected by a ballot of the 24 regional councillors subsequent to the fall municipal election. Mr. Pomeroy has served in that position since the mid

deputy clerk Pat Crimmins, Halton Hills lawyer Bert Arnold and developer Ab Tennant

were set in Milton general division court

Mr. Arnold will stand trial with Mr. Pomeroy January 17. The case is expected to last 10 days. A second trial involving Mr. Pomeroy, Mr. Tennant and Ms Crimmins has been set for February 20. It will continue February 22, 23

A date for a possible third trial including all four accused won't be set until January 17.

"Further action may be required on that depending on the resolution of the other matters," said Judge James Carnwath.

Judge Carnwath told the court he couldn't set

the trial dates sooner because of the unavailability of judges, as well as scheduling problems among all parties.

Mr. Pomeroy is charged with two counts each of breach of trust and accepting a secret commission. The charges allege that he took a bribe of \$80,000 and shares in a land development company while holding elected office.

Charges were laid against Mr. Pomeroy and the others last year after more than two years of investigation by Project 80, a joint forces police team established to probe allegations of municipal government corruption.
