


## New look Merchants take the ice next week

Ten days and counting, until the start of a new season of Central Junior A hockey — and the start of a new era for the Milton Merchants.

Fans will be seeing a very different looking team next Friday evening at Memorial Arena when the Merchants kick off the 1994/95 season against the Oakville Blades.

The club's biggest change will be mer, longtime skipper Rick Bince decided it was time for a change and stepped down as head coach of the Merchants. Shortly after this decision, owner Bradley Grant named interim assistant Dan Walker as the new head coach.

Walker, who came to Milton from the Metro League's Bramalea Blues, will guide the team along with assistant Dave Switzer, last year's head coach of the Royal York Rangers. With several top over-agers leaving the club this year, including Pat Henneberry, Ryan Delorande, Daner Finn, Troy Sweet, Doug Mann, Adam Hagen and Mike Cox, Walker and Switzer will have the task of building a new hockey squad. However, Milton will still have a couple of crafty veterans on the forward lines in Jamie Janjevich and

Scott Bertoli. Janjevich, a 20-year-old third-year centre, will play his final season of Junior A hockey this year and has been named team captain.

"It feels good (being named captain), I get along great with the new coaches and players and I don't think the leadership responsibility will be a problem," said Janjevich, last year's team scoring leader and MVP.

"This year I'm going for 100 points, but I did have two great linemates last year who helped my point behind the bench. Earlier this sum- total, so we'll just have to wait and see what happens."

Bertoli, an 18-year-old winger, has opted to go the university route in his hockey career and will return for his

sophomore season with Milton. Last year's team and league Rookie of the Year recipient, Bertoli is expected to be one of the assistant captains and assume more of a leadership role this

Also returning to action next weekend will be forwards Sean Lindsay, Shane Leamon, Mike McPhail, Anthony Sa and Chad Turner, rear guards Rick MacDonald, Rich MacKenzie, Danny Back and goaltender Jeff Lillie.

Recently returning from OHL camp as well. in Kitchener, Lillie could be the team's number one puckstopper this season, depending on if Scott Hay comes back from the OHL training

camp in Sarnia.

"As far as I'm concerned right now, Jeff is our number one goalie," said Grant. The Merchant owner has also signed promising forwards Robert Gubala and Steve Clark, who have been impressive in early pre-season play. Gubala is a 17-year-old centre from Chicago, with great speed and good hands around the net.

Mr. Grant agreed with his new head coach, stating that this Merchant club can finish in the top four. "It will take a while to get that magic chemistry, but when it's all said and done, I think this team will be better than last season's," said Grant, "We're going to put out an exciting brand of hockey for the fans."
