





Subsidized housing in hands of municipal hearing board

The Ontario Municipal Board (OMB) hearing into whether 41 nonprofit townhouses can be built by Sib-Jel next to Milton's fairgrounds finally wound up in Toronto Monday.

A two-part written decision — a ruling and the reasoning behind it isn't expected until sometime in December.

"It's hard to know which way the Board is going to go. I'm encouraged that they reserved their decision. If it had been clear cut in favour of the developer, the decision would have been immediate so I remain optimistic," said Wally Hunter.

The newly elected Ward 2 councillor has been representing just over 200 residents concerned about what they see as a higher density development in what they consider a lower density neighborhood.

"The concern I have is with the NDP policy on non-profit housing. which is clear. It may be a case that there's a forced effort to push these through regardless of our concerns," said Mr. Hunter.

Immediate decision

Provincial policies say 25 per cent of new development must be affordable housing. Sib-Jel lawyer Gordon Petch did push for an immediate decision Monday, said Mr. Hunter.

The hearing, which took place last August, was resumed briefly early this fall after OMB officers wanted more information on noise and lighting effects of the fairgrounds' on the proposed townhouses. While Sib-Jel commissioned studies on both, the Town then responded with a review of the studies and pushed for heightened remedial measures on noise and lighting.

Mr. Hunter continued to underline the issue of incompatibility from a planning perspective.

The hearing officers' busy schedule resulted in some delays and finally

ended with the hearing's conclusion taking place at the OMB's Bay Street offices Monday.

High density

Mr. Hunter said he continued to cross-examine witnesses on the basis of higher density while a representative of the Milton Fairgrounds expressed concerns about noise levels and safety issues at this year's fair, during which over 1,000 youths were reported scaling fences and hanging around the fairgrounds.

Mr. Hunter also said a concern was raised that while local residents just accept the fairgrounds activity as tradition, an increased number of new residents to the neighborhood could result in the Town's noise bylaw being enforced against the fairgrounds.

"I can't get a really good feel for which way it's (the decision) going to go," said Mr. Hunter.
