

# Minor peewees' win sends Niagara Falls into the drink

Shot after shot from every angle was fired by the Halton shooters who were stymied by the Burlington goalie. A couple did go in, however, and the Hurricanes took a 3-2 victory. Todd Gilmour scored from

Keen intensity, strong forechecking, great backchecking and outstanding defensive positioning were the keys behind yet another come-from-behind effort, this time a 3-3 tie with Stoney Creek. With time running down in the dying seconds of the third period, Kemp eluded some tenacious checking and rifled a shot from the faceoff circle. Matt Stockton had a good game on defense. Goals were scored by Ryan Ellis (2), William Goba and Chris Hay. Assists went to Ellis, Stefano Citton, Billy Stevenson and Brownlea.

The team showed confidence and poise but didn't get the bounces in a 2-2 draw with Brampton. The passing attack on the powerplay did work, however, and the Hurricanes capitalized.

Aaron Cowey and Matt Clark played well, and again the penalty killers earned their keep with a super effort. Ellis notched the first goal and then connected with Hay in the dying seconds to secure the tie. Goba, Tyler Prue and Citton earned assists while the glove hand of Ryan McManus sizzled, stopping several close hard shots.

Crisp and accurate passing was a feature of the 3-3 fast-paced exciting match-up against Niagara Falls. John Gleed powered the defense with deft

poke-checks and lots of effort.

Josh Vanderbruggen pumped in shots on goal from the point, with great work in close from Stevenson helping to keep the pressure on. Matt Fielding was solid in goal for Halton. Ellis scored two of the goals with Clark earning the other. Goba and Stevenson each had two assists with one other going to Hay.

Joel Petkoff scored on a nice feed from Konkle, then Nairn on a short-handed marker from Petkoff and

Chad Vinden, followed by Joey Faraone with the help of some good passing by his linemates Craig McDonald and Jarrett Konkle.

On the fifth Halton goal, Jacob Bailey (AP from Orangeville) converted a Petkoff pass with a nice shot from the point. In the third period Chris Alarie, Nairn and Konkle completed the scoring with assists from Vinden, Faraone, and Petkoff.

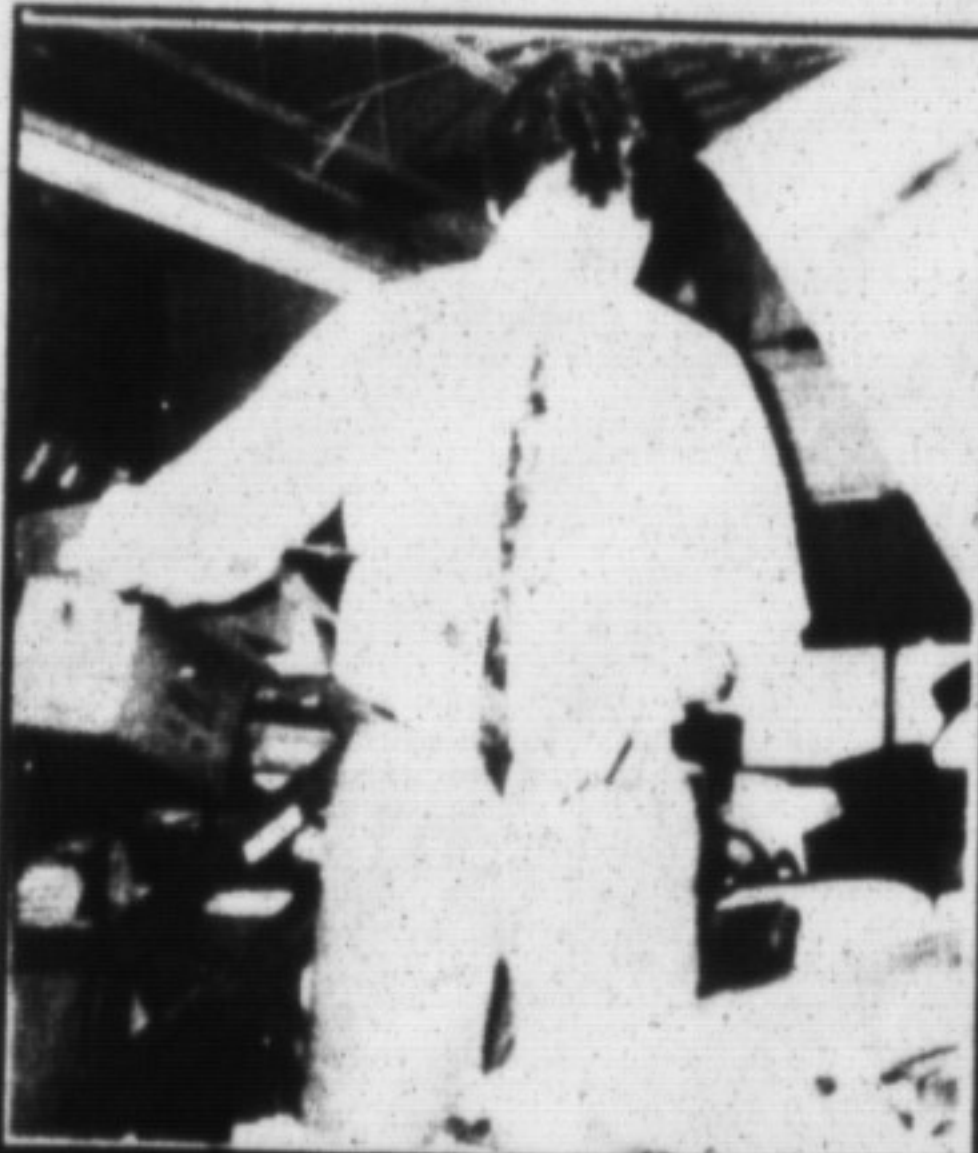

The final date for appealing your 1994 assessment to the Assessment Review Board is January 10, 1995. There is a fee for filing an appeal.
