A beautifully decorated baby's room is selecting flooring. always a perfect welcome home for a newborn.

But, if you're at the point where it's time to replace the cradle with a bed and pass the change table onto someone else, you may want to consider converting your baby's room into a multi-purpose room that will keep your child occupied as he or she grows older. When decorating a child's room, it's important to think ahead to make certain the room will accommodate his/her changing needs.

Planning ahead is particularly important when choosing a colour scheme. For example, consider selecting neutral background colours for walls and carpets. Flooring Options

If you decide to carpet the room, avoid course carpeting that can be abrasive to children who are still crawling or who will spend most of the time playing on the floor. In addition, make sure you choose a dark colour since stains are more visible on lightcoloured carpeting.

Cork tiles are ideal for a playroom since they are warm and easy to maintain. Vinyl floors, made of a thick, cushioned grade, are also durable.

If you opt for wooden floors, keep an eye out for loose boards, splinters or protruding nails that could cause injury.

Choosing Furniture

Planning ahead is also important when selecting furniture. Whether you're buying a whole new set of furniture or just adding to existing pieces, it's best to select furniture that can be adjusted as you child grows.

For example, there are many shelving systems and desks that can be elevated to keep pace with your child's growth. If you plan to install a shelving system, make sure you secure it against a wall so there's no chance of it falling over.

Sturdy and durable pieces of furniture are ideal for children's rooms since they don't chip easily and can stand up to heavy use. Even though this furniture may be more expensive, it's worth it to spend a little more money on pieces that will last longer.

Avoid furniture with sharp or rough edges that can injure your child. Special protective corner guards can be purchased for added protection.

Maximizing Storage Space

If you're tight on storage space, beds with storage bins underneath are an excellent buy.

Younger children usually need a lot more storage space for toys than clothes. So, keep an eye out for large plastic or wooden toy bins which are sure to come in handy.

Stacking storage baskets and low-level cupboards will also help maintain order in the

Safety Precautions

As with every other room in your home, make sure all electrical fittings are shielded. Safety socket covers are an excellent way to ensure inquisitive little ones don't poke small metallic objects into unused electrical outlets.

You should install safety latches on windows

Electrical radiators, light fixtures, portable fans and drapery cords can also be very dangerous, so keep them well out of the reach of

Energy pulse

Is your heat going right out the window?

Why not do a checkup on your home's energy fitness.

To take its energy pulse, follow these erly. points.

Air Leakage: Excess air leakage can account for up to 40 per cent of your heat loss. Make your own draft tester with a feather and toothpick or a light plastic vegetable bag and flutter test the potential leak points. Check inside edges of windows and doors, the electrical outlets and baseboards. Caulking and weatherstripping will stop escaping energy dollars and cut drafts.

Basement: The basement can be responsible for up to one quarter of your heating costs. Check for air leaks along the sill plate and around plumbing and electrical service entrances. Are the headers well insulated,

with a sealed vapor barrier on the warm side? When finishing the basement, insulate prop-

Attic: You might have increased the level of insulation in the attic, but did you check for a good air-vaper barrier on the warm side of the insulation? Warm, household air can escape into the attic through penetrations around ceiling light fixtures, exhaust fans, the plumbing stack, tops of partition walls and a poorly weatherstripped attic hatch.

Windows: Do you have well fitting double-glazed windows or properly installed storms? Is the weatherstripping in good shape and the interior trim suitably caulked? It may be time to upgrade or replace your windows. Review the variety of options in energy-efficient windows before making a choice.



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
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
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
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
