
Feeling lucky? Take a chance



Make it a safe holiday: firefighters

Christmas is a time for celebration, not

disaster. However, some holiday season traditions present fire hazards in the home.

The Milton Fire Department recommends using an artificial tree to decorate your home due to the low fire risk.

But for those diehards who must have a real tree, there are some things to remember to keep you and your family safe over the holidays.

· Always choose a fresh-cut tree with high moisture content. A moist tree is less likely to catch fire than a dry one.

· Always store the tree outside until you are ready to use it. Make a new diagonal cut at least two inches from the butt before setting the tree up indoors.

· Stand the tree in a container that holds plenty of water and be sure to refill it each

• Ensure the tree is securely anchored so it will not tip over or come into contact with any heat source.

· Only use Christmas lights that are CSA approved and always check for damaged or frayed cords and plugs.

• Use only a 15 amp power source for your decorations, and if you are popping the fuse or tripping the breaker, never use a higher amp fuse. Most cords are only designed to carry a certain current load. When a larger fuse is used and a problem develops with the device, the increased current will heat up the wire beyond its capabilities and the wire will eventually catch fire.

· Use only non-flammable ornaments and remember to always turn the lights out before going out or to bed.

· When finished with your tree, it's best to remove it as soon as possible.

· To check and see how dry a tree is,
