#### Broken mirror means bad luck for Milton driver

The superstitious belief that a broken mirror is bad luck held true for a Milton man Wednesday.

The 57-year-old Prince Street man faces several charges, including impaired driving, after a pick-up truck crossed the centre line of a rural Milton road as a Halton Regional Police cruiser approached from the opposite direction.

The mirrors of the vehicles collided and broke off, said Sgt. Frank Phillips, Halton Regional Police spokesman.

"The driver of the pick-up did not stop after the collision and continued southbound," he said. "The officer was able to turn around and catch up to the vehicle approximately 2 km from where the collision occurred."

No one was injured and damage to both vehicles was minor.

The incident took place on Sixth Line; just south of No. 15 Sideroad, shortly before midnight. \* The man also faces one count of driving with over the legal limit of alcohol in his blood as well as Highway Traffic Act charges of

## Taxpayers object

# Council nixes pricey phase-in scheme

The phase-in is out.

A plan to phase in some of the extreme effects of Market Value Assessment (MVA) was overturned by town council Monday night in front of a

full house of concerned taxpayers. Several taxpayers told council they were upset with having to defer the property tax relief MVA

ers when property taxes are due in the spring. Under the phase-in plan, those getting large decreases then would have helped offset costs for those getting large increases, for a period of three years. The full effect of MVA would not have been felt until the fourth year.

Ward 1 Councillor Rick Day said he changed his position on the phase-in program because it would have had a negligible affect on most prop- cerned that council would authorize the expendi-

to poor assessments, which should be appealed.

Other councillors representing rural taxpayers were also concerned with the unknown effects the phase-in program could have on some farm properties.

There were several cited instances in which a farm property was entitled to a decrease in taxes under MVA, but would actually get an increase. This is due to provincially funded farm tax credition reductions, which could offset gains with MVA.

Despite some reassurances from provincial officials, rural councillors were not convinced administrative changes would correct the problem.

Councillor Challinor defended the phase-in-idea, saying property taxes have long been levied on an unequal basis. He referred to the difference between the urban and rural mill rates, saying the urban part of town subsidizes the rural one.
