Some years ago I had the pleasure of spending six weeks in Europe, and when there, I visited many historical sites in countries with recorded histories much more ancient than our own.

However, upon returning home and reflecting upon my experience. I realized that many of the locations I had visited were not nearly as well explained and presented as some I had visited right here in Canada.

Three that spring to mind are Louisbourg, Ste. Marie Among the Hurons and the Ontario Agricultural Museum.

I understand that this is a time of restraint and could comprehend if the Museum were asked to scale back its programs and raise fees for a time, at least until fiscal stability returns to Ontario, but to close it completely this is to destroy our heritage! Once the doors are shut I very much fear that it will be gone forever, and that would be a loss to me, my children, and to all the people of Ontario - not to mention the gap it would create in the tourism industry.

How can shutting down a wonderful drawing card, an important part of a major industry,

tourism, make Ontario a more prosperous and fiscally responsible province?

I am asking the provincial government to reconsider the ramifications of this decision, culturally, fiscally and morally. By closing the Ontario Agricultural Museum, we are robbing our children of an important part of their her-


### This young man is tops
