Culprit drives off with pricey air compressor

The theft of a piece of construction equipment from a yard on Steeles Avenue has investigators wondering if someone saw the daring action, but didn't realize it was a crime at the time.

On Wednesday, Jan. 3, staff were at the yard at James Downs & Sons at 13693 Steeles Ave. in Milton at 7 a.m.

Everything appeared to be in order and employees left the yard on business. Upon returning at 11 a.m., it was discovered someone had driven off with an air compressor trailer unit.

Marks left in the snow indicated the culprit used a vehicle with dual wheels in the rear to tow the compressor. The tire tracks also suggested the thief drove west on Steeles Avenue from the

Stolen was an "Atlas Capco" air compressor trailer that was yellow and had a single axle. Despite its age, the unit was apparently in excellent condition. Buying a replacement today would cost at least \$15,000.
