Blades edge Milton 4-3 in overtime

They had their 14-game unbeaten streak snapped this past weekend, yet even in defeat the Milton Merchants refused to walk away emptyhanded.

The loss came courtesy of the Blades, who squeaked by with a 4-3 decision Sunday afternoon in Oakville. However, the home team needed overtime to claim the victory — and as a result, the Merchants skated away with one more point for their efforts.

With two previous wins last week, 3-2 and 4-0 decisions over Bramalea and Burlington respectively, Milton continues to sit in third-place in the West Conference with a 22-13-7 record.

"Our defensemen were atrocious with the puck and our forwards were soft up front as well," said head coach Gregg Carrigan of Sunday's loss. "Sunday afternoon games have not been good for us this season, the guys were not quite focused for this one.

"We seem to take too many penalfies against them (Oakville) and they were very good on the puck battles today. They've beaten us four times now and I don't relish the idea of facing them in the first round of the playoffs," he added."

Oakville's overtime winner came off the stick of Jay Stewart, who caught a piece of the puck from a bad clearing attempt by Milton goalie Dave Dolecki and slammed home a low slapshot with Dolecki out of position.

The Merchants had come back to tie the game at 17:44 of the third on a shot by Robert Gubala, who had assisted on both second-period goals to help his team erase an early 2-0 Oakville lead.

Also scoring for the visitors were Phil James and

Cory Holland while James and Pavo Kekki drew dozen saves. The game saw a number of affiliate single assists. Dolecki came in to work the last two periods plus overtime, after starter Steve Bewley's oncoming flu bug got the better of him in the opening frame.

Two nights earlier at home, the Merchants recorded their fourth straight win against the firstplace Bramalea Blues. The streak includes a semifinal victory at the Newmarket Showcase Tournament.

While holding off on their usual tight-checking, aggressive format, Milton was able to stay close to the Blues through the first two periods — erasing a pair of one-goal leads before moving ahead themselves in the final 90 seconds of play.

James notched the powerplay game winner. He did a nice job of redirecting a beautiful Rick MacDonald slapshot through goalie Bob Dacosta's legs. Also assisting on the play was Gubala.

Turning in another sound performance between the pipes was Dolecki, who earned his 12th win this season. Jeff Haydar played big up front and scored his team's first goal and assisted on Kekki's second-period goal, a blueline wrist shot for his first of the year.

Drawing a pair of assists was Brian Jones, while Richard Reid had one. Captain Steve Clarke turned in an impressive two-way effort with big checks at both ends. "There was some big penalty killing on both sides tonight (Friday) and some very good positional play. We didn't seem to play our game until the third period. Before that we weren't forechecking or driving to the net," said Carrigan.

Milton's victory over Burlington last Tuesday at Memorial was their third shutout this season, and the first for Dolecki, who came up big with two

players called up including Chris Healey and Jeff Dean from the Erin Junior C Shamrocks and Steve Roy and Darren Haydar of the Halton Hurricane midgets.

They did a solid job replacing Jones, Holland, James and Steve Adams, who all sat out with nagging injuries. The Merchants had little trouble scoring the win against the offensively weak Cougars — who currently sit six points behind St. Michael's for the final playoff spot.

Reid led the attack with two goals and an assist while Clarke and Mark McPhail added singles. Drawing two assists was Kevin Lamb, with single helpers going to Clarke, Jeff McArthur and David DelMonte.

Merchant notes: No official decision has come from the OHA on whether Dave Aussem will be allowed to return this season. Coach Carrigan said further discussions are currently being held between the OHA, Aussem and the Bramalea coaching staff. He added he only wants the 20year-old forward to return if he is ready to play and able to handle himself.

Captain Steve Clarke and defenseman Jeff McArthur each drew an assist while representing Milton at last Wednesday's all-star game in Bowmanville. Their West Conference squad lost a 6-3 decision to the East All-Stars.

Along with seeing occasional ice time with the junior club, 16-year-old Darren Haydar has been showcasing his offensive talents with the Hurricane midgets this season. Last weekend he took home three game MVP awards and was the leading scorer at a tournament in Niagara Falls. He scored six goals and 15 total points.

The Merchants host Streetsville this Friday and travel to Toronto to battle St. Michael's Sunday.
