Big turnout for farm issue talks

More than 100 Halton area farmers gathered at Hillcrest United Church last

Tuesday night to exchange ideas on pre-

serving their agricultural rights. Organized by the Halton Region Federation of Agriculture (HRFA), and billed as a Forum on Landowners' Rights, the evening featured three speakers, all; sharing their ideas on how today's farmers can convince government to preserve the

business of agriculture in the region. Pat Murphy of Halton Region's planning department spoke to the group about balancing land use and property rights.

He was followed by Herman Turkstra, a lawyer who specializes in dealing with various agricultural agencies

Concluding the evening was James White, an agricultural consultant, who gave his vision for agricultural landowners' rights in the future.

"The Tuesday night meeting was an information meeting, "said HRFA's Jamie Fisher, one of the organizers. "It was organized to give local farmers an idea of the issues we're concerned about, so they can bring their own ideas back to the second meeting, and put together some policy statements."

The second meeting was planned for yesterday (Tuesday) at Hillcrest Church.

Issues under consideration range from guidelines for agricultural land use, to dealing with nuisance complaints from nearby urban residents. Suggested policies could include expropriation procedures, severances, notification of zoning or designation changes and perhaps trespass laws.

"The present landowners' rights policy of 'the right to use and enjoy property' is a little too general," says Mr. Fisher. "We want it to be more specific, from an agricultural point of view."

Mr. Fisher expects the final draft of proposals will be finished by the end of March. Following that the group will lobby & for changes in the current system.
