## Insurance break for town may be forthcoming

If federal legislation is passed as expected this fall, the Town of Milton will save \$5,200 a year in insurance premiums.

Currently Milton is forced to help pay insurance premiums for railway crossings where the Town has requested that train whistling stop. However, legislation is expected this fall which will eliminate the requirement for whistling at intersections where the municipality has met federal govern-

The proposal went from Milton and several other municipalities through the Federation of Canadian Municipalities (FCM), which lobbied the government to make the changes. According

to town clerk Bill Roberts the money saved on insurance premiums can be used to improve crossings.

### Renaissance Festival rebirth

Minor changes to a zoning agreement should pave the way for the Ontario Renaissance Festival to operate on a seasonal basis in Milton.

Changes approved by town council include demanding

rehabilitation of festival lands for farm use if the event is discontinued.

Also, the festival will only take place in July, August and September. Once these changes are in place the Ontario Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Rural Affairs will withdraw its list of concerns submitted to the Ontario Municipal Board.
