
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TIME TO GO TO FLORIDA — BASEBALL SEASON COMING



> Despite an 11-year oversight, a guide dog school in Oakville that was finally collared by provincial assessors will escape a portion of its property

> Recently regional council decided to waive Halton's portion of the school's annual property tax bill, despite a recommendation at the committee level not to support the exemption. The Town of Oakville had already approved an exemption for the school.

> Citing unusual circumstances, Oakville Mayor Anne Mulvale carried her appeal to council after failing to generate support from members of the administration and finance committee last week.

> Several councillors stood firm, however, unwilling to set a precedent of waiving property taxes, no matter how worthwhile the organization.

> But council waived the region's portion of the school's tax bill and supported a move to create a permanent exemption through private legislation

at the provincial level. Several other organizations in Halton have permanent exemptions through legislation.

Guide dog school saved from Halton taxes

The Lion's Foundation, a registered charity, has been operating a school in Oakville for 11 years providing guide dogs to serve those with sight,

hearing or mobility impairments. They produce about 50 dogs per year, 503 since the program began. Dogs are given to people from across Canada. Each dog takes 18 months to train.

They operate out of an old school with an annual budget of \$2.3 million, which comes from corporate spon-

sors and private donations. The property tax issue arose when they recently applied for a building permit to expand, and were told development fees would be due.

An attempt at Oakville council to have the group

also did not pay property taxes backfired, when it was discovered the school should not have been freed from property taxes. They have been subsequently added to the tax rolls. The school's new annual bill for property taxes is \$23,370, of which \$3,069 is the regional portion.

"The site has always been a school, there have never been property taxes paid on it," said Mayor Mulvale to the committee. "This facility is lifechanging. It's amazing."

Burlington Councillor Ralph Scholtens said he sympathized with the Lions Foundation and Mayor Mulvale, but couldn't understand why recipients of the guide dogs pay nothing for the service.

Councillors heard the public school board, which receives the largest portion of property taxes, did not support an exemption.

"Dollars being eroded from the tax base is an issue for all governments," warned Burlington Councillor Jack Dennison at committee, "Permanent exemption shouldn't be granted to anyone. That would just be compounding errors that have been going on for 10 years."

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
