Physician sees red over vaccine stand

Then I saw children suffering and dying.

I saw a six-year-old patient of mine dying of tetanus. She couldn't talk, couldn't breathe. The gentlest touch, any sound, even a ray of light would send this child into excruciating convulsions. I saw the look of terror and grief in her parents' eyes when I told them their little girl was dying. This child would have lived had she been vaccinated.

I saw a 14-year-old girl develop encephalitis after catching measles. She had been a high would tell me that in Africa, they valued their school cheerleader, an honours student, and children more than we do in Canada.

president of her class. She now couldn't recognize her parents and her friends, she couldn't talk, she couldn't walk or care for herself.

I saw the suffering in her mother's eyes. She carried a double burden. She saw both her daughters' suffering, and the loss of promise and potential in a child who could no longer understand. This girl could have been a community leader, a loving wife and a mother today, had she been given the second dose of measles vaccine children are receiving now through the province.

I saw my patients who lived among the garbage heaps of Miamey, Niger. I saw their children playing playing in the open sewers. I can imagine their look of astonishment and disbelief if I were to tell them that in Canada we were going to stop vaccinating our children. They

I saw the parts of the world where 50,000 people die every day of water borne diseases like polio. I saw my middle-aged patients who suffered polio before Dr. Jonas Salk's vaccine was developed. I'm sure Dr. Turner, and Ms Barbiero, that these people who suffered the ravages of polio are pleased to have a strong immune system, and that their daily weakness, back pain, depression, loss of mobility, and loss of income are small prices to pay.

I told the Milton Ratepayers Association at their meeting last Thursday that we are but soldiers fighting a never-ending battle against the forces of infection. This battle has been going on since the creation of the planet. Our weapon is knowledge. The other side's weapons are complacency, ignorance and half-truths.

In North America, and northern Europe, we enjoy our relative good health because of the

work, suffering, and sacrifice of Anton van Leeuwenhoek, Ignaz Semmerlweiss, Robert Lister, Louis Pasteur, Robert Koch, Alexander Fleming, Jonas Salk and many others. These scientists first identified the bacteria and viruses that cause illness, and developed the first rudimentary weapons to fight them.

We have benefited from their work. In the 20th century, the average life expectancy has increased due to public health measures such as water and sewage treatment, and vaccination.

However, if more people allow themselves to be misled, then, diphtheria, tetanus, polio, cholera, typhoid fever, meningitis, rubella and o other horrific diseases will become household & words in Milton and we will be faced with the same bleak, but informed choices of my patients in Africa and the Caribbean.

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
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
