FUNDING

All hospitals in Ontario are awaiting the government decision on funding for the fiscal year commencing April 1, 1996. The announcement is expected to include funding cuts although some financial relief may be offered to hospitals in high growth areas

These hospitals in Halton, Peel, North York and Durham Regions have joined forces to establish a case for some funding adjustments for growth but this has not yet been confirmed by the government.
