Beer Store robbed by armed thug

An impatient robber pulled a Beer Store clerk over the counter and poked a gun into his chest after demanding money Tuesday night.

"The (robber) produced a gun and demanded money," said Sgt. Frank Phillips, Halton Regional Police spokesman. "The clerk momentarily hesitated and was pulled over the counter and had the gun shoved into his chest."

The robber then released the clerk and handed over a plastic bag, ordering him to fill it with money, police said.

The clerk complied and the gunman fled the store on foot. He was last seen running westbound on Millside Drive."

No shots were fired and the clerk wasn't injured in the robbery, which occurred shortly after 6:30 p.m.

The robber is described as male, white, five-foot-eight to five-foot-10. He has a slim build with a muscular chest. He also has a flushed complexion. He was wearing a blue or green plaid lumber jacket. The gun is described as a black snub nose revolver.

A few reports of violence

Tensions rise on picket lines

Tensions are mounting between citizens and striking Ontario Public Service Employees Union (OPSEU) workers at two main picket line locations in town.

"The public is starting to get irate," said Halton Regional Police Staff Sgt. Roy Smith.

Students and parents have reported delays as long as 45 minutes while trying to drive into the E.C. Drury High School complex, where OPSEU employees are picketing at both entrances, Staff Sgt. Smith said.

One of the picketers hit a car windshield with this fist Wednesday afternoon, cracking the glass, a youth told The Champion.

The youth said he was leaving the complex with a friend at 3:20 p.m. when his car was swarmed by pick-

The striking workers are say they have been victimized as well. Two picketers, one who was sent to hospital, have been hit by cars at entrances to the complex.

The situation isn't any more peaceful at the Maplehurst Correctional Centre entrance, where police have been called repeatedly.

Officers are considering laying a charge of obstructing police against one stubborn picketer, Staff Sgt. Smith said.

"There was one incident where one of the picketers

refused to move aside to let a truck through."

Tensions among Maplehurst employees have been rising since two bargaining unit members were treated in hospital for smoke inhalation after inmates set fires at the Martin Street correctional centre.

The government has complained to the Labour Relations Board that jail guards, who are among 13,500 essential workers across the province, are breaking an essential services agreement by keeping prisoners cellbound in some jails, including Maplehurst.

However, OPSEU president Leah Casselman, who was at the Maplehurst picketing site Wednesday, said the agreement only calls for "care, custody and control" of inmates by staff.

The government is trying to "buy out" the inmates by given them rights to see visitors and make purchases at the canteen, she said, and in the process, the environment is less safe for the skeleton staff currently on the

"People are going to get killed," she warned.

She added that OPSEU has no plans to pull essential service workers from the jail, contrary to rumours, because "that's exactly what the government wants them to do so they can end the strike."

The labour board has sided with the government, however. A judge ruled Wednesday that inmates have the right to spend time out of their cells, and the free
