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or pepper sprayed. However, attitudes are great on the lines now. There are a lot of solid individuals out there, they're not tiring and they're not going to break," Ms Coker stressed.

The 10-day old strike has also caused some concern for store owners at Milton Mall - where a boycott by local OPSEU strikers may already be in affect.

This was sparked last Tuesday, when mall manager Marion Shannon refused to let picketers at E.C. Drury High School and Trillium School use the mall's parking facilities.

Bruce Lee, president of OPSEU local 223 which includes the Trillium School employees said the union was "not asking for a great amount of spaces" and that local strikers are unhappy with the refusal.

"We'd only need about a dozen spaces at any one time, and Allendale employees were using it when they went on strike. I don't feel that good about it," he said.

As a result, local union presidents sent a letter to all mall tenants Friday informing them of Ms Shannon's decision and that, "Fourteen hundred OPSEU workers and their families who live and work in Milton and would purchase goods from you store will be shopping elsewhere."

Ms Shannon said store owners have expressed concern over the letter, but not with her decision. "We only have 900 parking spaces and with 300 employees alone, we need every available space we've got.

"We have to refuse people on bus tours and car dealerships all the time. I can't say no to one group and yes to another, I'm not taking sides one way

or the other. They've threatened to picket us as well and boycott the mall, but I don't take kindly to threats," added Ms Shannon, who noted picketers are welcome to use the mall's washroom facilities.

She said so far any kind of shopping boycott has not been overly apparent.

And while court cases are still being delayed and parents still finding it difficult to drop off and pick up their children, it seems problems on the picket lines are slowly diminishing — at least at E.C. Drury High School, where cases of both picketer and public violence were reported last week.

"We've had some violent situations, but they were mostly during the first week. Things seem to be okay now that everyone is a little more educated as to what's happening," said picket captain Howard Wilson.
