DiPalma fourth at international competition

Amy DiPalma kicked off her 1996 rhythmic gymnastics season in style, showcasing her talents at last weekend's Niagara International Rhythmic Challenge at Brock University in St. Catharines.

The 12-year-old local gymnast didn't let the pressure of her first international competition hinder her performance as she finished fourth overall in the 27-participant National Novice IV class.

Competing against gymnasts from Hungary and the Czech Republic along with those from Nova Scotia, Manitoba, British Columbia, Quebec and Ontario, Amy also struck silver in the ball event.

She placed fourth in hoop, just missing the top three with a costly throw-out, and finished sixth in rope. Her ball and hoop performances were among her personal best over the past two years.

"It was my first international meet, so I really didn't expect to do as well as I did. I was pretty happy with my performances," said Amy, who trains under coach Nadia Mihaylova at the Etobicoke Olympium Rhythmic Gymnastics Club.

She will demonstrate her skills Tuesday at the Harborfront Castle in Toronto, where she and 15 other top rhythmic gymnasts will perform the opening number at the Canadian Amateur Athletes'

In only her third year of competitive rhythmic gymnastics, Amy has now jumped up to the national level and will be looking to make a trip to the Canadian Championships this June in Montreal.

She'll first have to qualify at the Eastern Regionals in May at her

Etobicoke Olympium Club. Only the top eight finishers will move on to the nationals. With strong performances recently and home-field advantage for the qualifying rounds, Amy is confident in her ability to reach the nationals this season.

She struck silver last season at the Ontario Provincial Championships.

"I think I can reach the nationals if I just keep working hard," said Amy.


