For almost 20 years, they've quietly gone about the task of promoting interest in local history.

Now, however, the Milton Historical Society has taken centrestage as one of three nominees for 1995 Civic Organization of the Year. With more than 100 members, the Milton Historical Society has built up quite a reputation among local history buffs — or those who simply love their community.

And no one knows of the group's tireless efforts more than president Helen Comber.

'This is a great group of people working for the historical society, here. They get behind anything that has to do with saving Milton's history and heritage," said Ms. Comber, who has been part of the group for eight years. "I was thrilled when I heard about the nomination. It's quite a prestigious award and it's nice to be nominated."

The Milton Historical Society has become well known for its publications, with recent books such as Milton, Remembers World War II by Ken Lamb, Milton Area Biographies by Alex Cooke, and a re-issued and updated History Walk in Historic Milton by Jim Dills.

In addition, the society also leads numerous walking tours through town, holds regular meetings with colorful guest speakers and is a leading contributor to February's Heritage Week, during which members take their expertise into local classrooms.

The organization's nominator said, "While the historical society moves quietly to meet its objectives, it's an effective organization, contributing to an enhanced understanding and appreciation of the community."

The Link Foundation as well as the entire business population and citizens of the town of Milton have also been nominated for Civic Organization of the Year.

The recipient of the Milton Chamber of Commerce award will be announced during a gala dinner-dance at Halton Hills Place April 13.


said the school board has no choice but to aggressively trim education system staff.

"Secretaries, teachers and everybody in education have not carried their weight in the cutbacks," he said. "Everybody has got to see the system is a Cadillac system and we have to change it into a Chevrolet."

Ms Elstub said secretaries perform an important function at schools, and students will suffer with the cuts. "Mothers and parents rely on secretaries to be a second mother, the kids run to us when they have a probleme" she said. "They're cutting social workers, instructional assistants and secretaries, and that's the heart of the school."

Ms Elstub said 39 of the 60 OPA members given pink slips were employed by the board in June 1992, when they surrendered raises in exchange for job security. As of Friday, that contract was still in effect.

Most secretaries earn between \$15,000 and \$25,000, the lowest-paid unionized employees working for Halton. As recently as 1994, there were 325 OPA members working for the public school board.


