Every child in this school board will suffer if the recently announced cuts are carried out. Imagine how the special needs of these children and the requirements of the other children will be met in large classrooms without an assistant.

As the saying goes ... it takes a village to raise a child. It takes parents, a community, a province, a country to raise a child. Perhaps the greatest tragedy of our present economic situation and the offered solutions is the burden we have rested upon our children.
